

### David Miller Hopes To “Dial” Up A Win

All eyes are on Golden Receiver in the Presidential final with his handy victories in the first two legs, but David Miller believes Dial or Nodial, coming out of post position two, has what it takes to knock off the heavy favorite.

“If it works our way, we can beat him. My horse drew inside and has good gate speed. If I’m close and somebody softens Golden Receiver up, he can win,” Miller said.

Dial Or Nodial grabbed fourth place in the second leg of the Presidential Series at the Meadowlands, rattling off a last

quarter of :26.2, but turning for home, he was too far behind of the top three finishers. While the effort from the 7-year-old son of Western Ideal was gutsy, Miller knows the race cannot unfold in a similar fashion this week.

“We were not in great position last time. Golden Receiver is so quick off the gate. Once he is on top, he just has his way,” he explained. “I have to stay as close as I can to win.”

Dial Or Nodial, a winner of more than \$1.5 million lifetime, was praised by Miller. “He is just an ultra-consistent horse. He always gives a game effort. He’s so versatile and easy to drive which is good for me. Jim Campbell has done an outstanding job with him.”

Dial Or Nodial has gotten away poorly in his first three starts of the year despite middle tier post positions. With Miller’s eyes squarely set on toppling the giant of the Meadowlands, expect Dial Or Nodial to be rated close to the front.

There is no better driver to have at the Meadowlands right now than Miller. He is the leading driver with 23 wins at the Meadowlands while his closest competitor, Yannick Gingras, had 14 wins through Jan. 19.

Miller said he has not changed anything this year at the Meadowlands and attributes his success to, “The horses I drive. I have had a little luck, and things have just fallen into place.”

If Miller’s good fortune at the Meadowlands continues Saturday night, Dial Or Nodial could add “2013 Presidential champion” to his long list of accolades. — By Jay Hochstetler

It’s not quite like the Harbaugh brothers matched up as head coaches of the opposing teams in the upcoming Super Bowl on Feb. 3 in New Orleans, but the Super Bowl final for 4-year-old trotters on Saturday night at the Meadowlands also has a participating family—although in this case they are on the same team.

With a pair of trotters trained by his wife, Julie, going postward in Saturday night’s \$51,000 Super Bowl final, Andy Miller had a tough decision to make as to which he would drive. Although he didn’t flip a coin to make his choice, Miller said he ultimately decided he would direct Windsun Galliano, while Yannick Gingras has been enlisted to drive Helios.

Miller will have his work cut out for him as Windsun Galliano drew post 10; Gingras and Helios will start from post eight.

While Helios won his division of the opening round of the Super Bowl on Jan. 10, he finished second in the second leg on Jan. 17. On the flip side, Windsun Galliano made an early break in his Super Bowl opener and was

never a factor, but he rebounded with an impressive score in the second leg.

“Obviously there is a whole field of horses to beat, but I think both of these are pretty good,” said Miller of the two trotters who didn’t arrive in the Miller barn until late December.

Windsun Galliano is owned by James Harper Jr., Elizabeth Harper and trainer Tracy Brainard, who did the conditioning until the transfer to Julie Miller. Winless in five starts last year, Windsun Galliano broke his maiden in his 2013 debut for his new barn with a 1:54.4 effort on Jan. 3 at the Big M. That was followed up by his miscue in the Super Bowl opener.

“He made that break when he got a little overanxious out of the gate,” explained Andy Miller.

Windsun Galliano broke his maiden with a first-over effort and it was virtually the exact same race trip he received when he scored his upset Super Bowl win on Jan. 17.

“Both wins were the same trip,” said Miller. “He was out a long ways; he is long winded and can take some air and keep going.”

As for Helios, owned by Meadowlands operator Jeff Gural’s Little E LLC, the son of Muscles Yankee won four of five starts last year for trainer Jessica Okusko and is now two-for-three in 2013 while in the Miller barn.

“He’s a very talented horse,” Miller said of Helios. “He is kind of a grinder and lazy, but he does what he has to. He just keeps going.”

Miller said both trotters will get a week off following the Super Bowl final and then return for the opening leg of the Charles Singer Memorial Series that gets underway Feb. 7 at the Meadowlands. — *By Gordon Waterstone*

## Improving Screen The Call Aims At Hirt Final

After ScreenThe Call finished a late-closing second in the opening two rounds of the Clyde Hirt Series at the Meadowlands after starting from posts nine and eight, trainer and co-owner Eric Ell was hoping the 4-year-old pacer would draw an inside post for Saturday night's \$67,400 final.

ScreenThe Call gets to move inside on Saturday night but not by much as he will start from post seven in the final of the series for 4-year-old male pacers. ScreenThe Call has made a habit of drawing poor posts as this will be the seventh time in nine career starts that he will line up in post seven or farther outside.

**"He's taken everything well for as hard as I was on him."**

"I'm telling you, he's the worst-drawing horse I've ever seen in my life," lamented Ell, who purchased Screen The Call in partnership with Tom Leager last fall at Harrisburg for \$26,000. "I was begging to draw the inside."

A half brother to the 2006 Breeders Crown 2-Year-Old Colt Pace champion Charley Barley and the 2011 James Lynch Memorial winner Fresh Idea, Screen The Call was bred by Kentuckiana Farms. The son of American Ideal was unraced at two and then made six starts as a 3 year old before a right front leg injury in late July curtailed his season.

"I had interest in him when I looked at the catalog," Ell explained of the purchase. "You could see he had speed at three and he was staked to everything. I saw (former trainer) Erv Miller before the sale and asked him what happened, and he said he injured the leg so they shut him down.

"When you're buying a horse who has had only six lifetime starts and had been laid off for that long, it's 'buyer beware,'" he continued. "You don't know what you are up against, but luckily I saw Erv and he told me what happened to him. I rolled the dice and now it looks like a great buy."

Ell said he went against his normal training regimen to get ScreenThe Call ready for the Hirt Series.

"I really had to rush him to make the series and I hate doing that," said Ell, who trains his 16-horse stable at a small farm in Denton, Md. "I had to train him every four days and hardly give him a day off. I hate doing that but to make the series, I thought I had to. He's done everything I asked of him and he's taken everything well for as hard as I was on him."

As for race strategy, Ell said the only thing he asked of driver Ron Pierce was that he looked for a somewhat easy journey in the Hirt opener since they had post nine.

"Coming off a 1:55 qualifier off six months off I told Ronnie, 'I don't care if he doesn't make the final, but don't leave with him,'" he said. "He took him back and then was parked the mile, but he was parked with cover. Everything worked in his favor. The next week he let him go out of there and dropped into the five hole."

As for the future, Ell said ScreenThe Call will next race in the Exit 16W Series that begins Feb. 9 at the Big M.

"He's been just a pleasure to have around," said Ell. "He's a big, good-looking colt and perfect mannered for a stud. He's

### CONDITIONS

- The fields and post positions for all races; preliminary, finals and consolations will be drawn by lot. All races 1 mile dashes.
- If there is more than one division of any preliminary race, each division will race for the full advertised purse. If more than three divisions of a preliminary race are required, right is reserved to race one or more of these additional divisions on the next two racing nights.
- The declared horses with the highest money-winnings will be eligible to the final and consolation races. The final and consolation races will be limited to eight starters. Choice of a starter for those horses that are declared in of horses with the same money-winnings will be drawn by lot except that a non-stable entry horse will be given preference over a horse creating a stable entry. In the event not enough money-winners declare for the final or consolations, starters in the series that are not money-winners may declare and will be drawn by lot, to obtain a full field of eight. A trainer and/or owner will be limited to only a two horse coupled entry in both the final and consolation. The consolation race must have six separate betting interests or it may be canceled by the raceway.
- Purse Distribution: 50% - First, 25% - Second, 12% - Third, 8% - Fourth, 5% - Fifth
- Declarations to start close at a prescribed time and date, and must be made for all preliminary, final and consolation races.
- Should circumstances prevent the racing of any or all of these races, monies paid in will be refunded to owners of horses nominated unless one race of the series has been contested. In the event of weather or other unforeseeable cancellation of any preliminary race, no make-up will be made. In the event of weather or other unforeseeable cancellation of the consolation and final races a make-up will be made the following week.
- One charted line meeting the qualifying standards is required within 30 days. If continued satisfactory performance is not maintained in races, additional qualifying line(s) will be required and subsequent declaration rejected until this requirement is fulfilled.
- There will be no refunds for horses that are not properly nominated.
- Yonkers Raceway reserves the right to refuse any horse, trainer, driver and/or owner to race in this series.
- These races will be conducted under the rules and regulations of the New York State Racing and Wagering Board and Yonkers Raceway General Rules and Procedures.
- Judges official order of finish will be used in determining eligibility to the Final events, exclusive of all appeals yet to be decided at the time of declaration to the Final events. 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## Another Prix d’Amerique Battle Between Ready Cash, Maharajah?

The 91st edition of France’s famed Prix d’Amerique trot, which was inaugurated as a thank you present to America for its intervention in World War I, takes place Sunday at the Vincennes racetrack, which is located in the large park of the same name.

Post time for the race will be approximately 9:30 a.m. Check harnessracing.com for updates on video and results.

The Prix d’Amerique is a sporting spectacle from the minute the doors open at the track. A crowd gathers outside, even in the coldest of weather, and a parade precedes the post parade for the big race.

The distance of the Prix d’Amerique is 2,700 meters, or about 1.67 miles. The race has a famous and tricky start where horses circle around in a “warm-up” area while a clock counts down to zero, at which time drivers can send their horses to the racing strip and straighten out and charge for position. That effectively signals the start of the race, although if horses are too disorganized there may be a recall.

This year 18 horses—all horses and mares, since geldings are not invited—will race for the one million euro (approximately \$1.3 million) Prix d’Amerique purse. The heavy favorite is France’s Ready Cash, who won the race in 2011 and 2012. He is trained by French horseman Thierry Duval Destin and driven by top reinsman Franck Nivard.

Another horse who has earned the respect of the European trotting community is Maharajah, who has a huge fan club as he is owned by a syndicate (Travkompaniets Stall AB) with more than 6,000 members! Margareta Wallenius-Kleberg’s Menhammar Stud manages the horse and has placed him with trainer Stefan Hultman. Maharajah battled heroically with Ready Cash in the 2011 Prix, finishing second, and then again last year before tiring and fading. Some believe that as this year’s Prix d’Amerique approaches he is at his best form in some time.

Lars Palm, The Horseman And Fair World magazine’s long-time European correspondent, is one who believes Maharajah is stronger than ever, but he also does not underestimate Ready Cash.

“The French know how to have their horse at their best for this race,” said Palm, who follows the French trotting scene either by flying to Paris or watching races on the French “sulky” channel via satellite. “Maharajah had a very good race in his last start. He is really peaking. The French journalists also like Timoko, and there is a dark horse in Un Mec d’Heripe.”

Another horse who is being mentioned by Prix d’Amerique prognosticators is Raja Mirchi, who won the Prix Tenor de Baune earlier in the month at Vincennes.

“What I’m afraid of for Raja Mirchi is (Lutfi) Kolgjini will probably go for the lead, but it’s not that easy to take control in this race,” said Palm. “But if he can make it, he might be able to hold on if he is not pressured. If he is pressured and gets tired, he makes breaks.”

Kolgjini, who trains, drives and owns Raja Mirchi, has been high on his horse since he was just a 2 year old. Kolgjini started Raja Mirchi's career early—at least early by Scandinavian trotting standards—and shipped him to the U.S. in July 2009 to compete in the Peter Haughton Memorial at the Meadowlands. With Ron Pierce driving, Raja Mirchi broke stride at the start in his elimination for the Haughton and was never a factor. The next week, on the eve of the Hambletonian, Kolgjini was at the Meadowlands to drive him in an overnight, but again the colt broke at the start.

Raja Mirchi bounced back and now Kolgjini again has visions of greater things for the horse. He told the Swedish media that he plans to nominate Raja Mirchi to the U.S. Breeders Crown and hopes the horse performs well enough so he can make a deal to stand him at stud in North America.

Kolgjini stands seven studs at his farm, including Raja Mirchi, who was bred to 74 mares in 2012. Kolgjini, who is known as a shrewd promoter of his horses, rightfully notes that Raja Mirchi's pedigree is has plenty of appeal for American breeders as he is by Viking Kronos and is out of a daughter of top North American performer Kit Lobell, a daughter of the legendary Keystone Pioneer.

Viking Kronos, a son of Hambletonian champion American Winner and Hambletonian Oaks victress Conch, was a top 2 year old in Italy, beating Varenne. He is also the sire of Maharajah. — *By Kathy Parker*

## Ourasi's Presence In Prix Not Forgotten

Earlier this month the best known and most beloved horse in France died. Ourasi, known by his fans as the "lazy king" because of his laid-back style, is the only four-time Prix

d'Amerique champion. He died at age 33 at a farm in France's Normandy province.

Arriving center stage at a time when world champion Lutin d'Isigny still ranked in first place, Ourasi won his first Prix d'Amerique in 1986 and repeated in 1987 and 1988. In 1989 he shocked the French trotting world when he faltered and finished third in the race, but he came back the very next year to win his fourth at age 10.

Ourasi also made news in the U.S. when he competed in the 1988 March of Dimes Invitational Trot at Garden State Park and finished second, beaten a neck by Sugarcane Hanover.

French television has documented Ourasi's career for many years, and the following video shows him racing down the stretch to his Prix d'Amerique victories, jogging on the beach in Normandy, and celebrating his 31st birthday with a basket of apples. 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
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## Choquette Recalls Delmonica's Prix Win

Like many, Aime Choquette has the memories of his life surrounding him on the walls of his apartment. Choquette, now 98, lives in Sherbrooke, Quebec, about 90 miles east of Montreal. A few of the photos he looks at frequently are of Delmonica Hanover, the great trotting mare he worked with during his many years as Delvin Miller's top assistant.

"I've got a painting of her on the way, and I also have a good picture on my wall that someone took of me training in France," said Choquette.



It has been 39 years since Choquette was in Paris with Delmonica Hanover. Miller, who became known as American harness racing's worldwide ambassador, had decided he wanted to try to win the Prix d'Amerique, and Delmonica was the horse he thought had a chance to become the first American-owned winner of the race. To this day Delmonica Hanover and Moni Maker are the only American-owned horses to win the race.

Miller deputized Choquette to scout around in Paris and find out what they had to prepare for in order to give the mare the best chance possible to win the race. It was sort of like scouting prior to invading enemy territory.

"When I got to Paris every Frenchman said, 'You don't have a chance!' recalled Choquette a few days before this year's Prix d'Amerique. "I went to check things out, and so I knew what I had to do if we brought her to France."

As a native of Quebec, Choquette thankfully had a command of the French language, but he was unfamiliar with the Vincennes racecourse, which to this day has a downhill slope in the homestretch and an uphill grade on the backstretch.

"I went uphill every day with her, so she was really in good condition for the race," said Choquette of preparing the mare for the Prix d'Amerique.

Miller had decided to turn the lines over to a driver who had knowledge of the intricacies of driving at Vincennes, and he chose the German ace Hans Fromming, who won the Prix d'Amerique back-to-back with Nike Hanover and Ozo in 1964-65. Miller made sure Fromming drove Delmonica before the Prix d'Amerique as well.

"He (Fromming) had put her on top and she only won one of seven races, so he decided to race her from behind (in the Prix d'Amerique)," recalled Choquette.

Delmonica raced in 10th place entering the backstretch as a longshot, Vismie, had the early lead. When the field of 18 turned for home, Fromming still did not have racing room. Finally, in late stretch he saw daylight and Delmonica's closing kick gave her the narrow victory over Axius of France, with the famous French mare Une de Mai third.

Miller, who watched the race from the clubhouse, told Choquette it was the greatest race he had ever seen. Choquette himself did not see the race.

"I was in the paddock and you couldn't see from there," he said. "I knew she had won when they announced her name." — *By Kathy Parker*

## Peter Gerry Driving In Paris

Peter G. Gerry (inset photo, right), amateur/gentleman USA driver and venture capitalist, will participate in a prestigious international amateur trot (Prix de Saint-Claude) on Saturday at Hippodrome Paris-Vincennes.

The 1 5/16-mile event attracts some of the best international amateur competitors. Gerry's participation was organized by legendary Swedish trainer Anders Lindqvist, now stabled in France at Grobois Training Center, and Anders Lindfors of Offspring Management AB, a respected stallion management firm. Gerry will drive Lindqvist's veteran French-bred trotter Quoriace Stop (a winner of over 140,000 euros, with a mile rate best time of 1:55.69) in this effort.

Gerry is the treasurer of the Harness Racing Museum and Hall of Fame, treasurer/director of the Delvin Miller Harness Drivers Association (DMHDA), administrators of the C.K.G. Billings Amateur Driving Series, and vice president/trustee of the Standardbred Retirement Foundation.

Gerry has competed passionately in each of the 31 editions of the Billings Series since its founding in 1982. From 1991 until 2010, he

served as president of the DMHDA. During that period the Billings Series membership grew from 10 members to a high of 150 in 2006. In addition, he instituted the

Championship Gold and Silver Cup races, contested annually for purses of \$25,000 and \$15,000 respectively.

Gerry has been driving competitively since 1973 and before that competed in matinees contested at the old training track at Pompano Park. He has directly owned horses since 1971 and is a partner in the Arden Homestead Stable.

As a driver, Gerry won the first edition of the Delvin Miller Memorial Driving Championship Gold Cup, contested at Freehold Raceway in November 1993, driving Crown Roast.

A graduate of Harvard College and the Harvard Business School, Gerry is the Managing Partner of Sycamore Ventures, a Princeton, NJ-based private equity and venture capital investment firm he co-founded in 1995. Prior to starting Sycamore, he served for 11 years as president of Citicorp Venture Capital, Ltd., a wholly owned subsidiary of Citigroup, where he was employed for 23 years. — *By Tom Hicks*

## Letter to the Editor:

The relatively low sale prices for Idyllic and Martiniontherocks at the Tattersalls January Mixed Sale at the Meadowlands Monday illustrates the problems Standardbred breeders and their clients, those who are selling quality bloodstock after their racing careers are over, face today.

If Thoroughbred mares with the same credentials were being offered at a major sale, the likelihood is that they would bring somewhere in the neighborhood of a million dollars and perhaps even more.

From my perspective, a great part of the reason that breeders find themselves in this pickle is because of the outmoded purse structure found at most harness tracks today. Often mid to low priced claimers have the opportunity to race for as much, if not more money, than they are worth. Whereas the person who has spent a great deal of money for a well-bred yearling and has sometimes spent even more training and staking them finds the opportunity to race them in other than stakes events very limited and the opportunity to race them for significant money virtually non-existent. Why would they want to continue doing this when they can get instant gratifi-

cation and satisfaction by claiming or buying a ready-made racehorse?

Granted, they are still some "sportsman" types out there who relish a challenge and are motivated to secure the very best. Buying quality yearlings is still the best way to achieve this. Sadly, the number of sportsman types keeps diminishing.

Is it any wonder that the demand for racehorses is still very strong, whereas the prices for even the best bred yearlings with the exception of a chosen few continues to plummet?


The time is coming—sooner rather than later—when those who are looking and willing to pay well for racehorses will find that the well has dried up. The vast majority of breeders are bleeding money with no foreseeable expectations that things will get better.

It's time that the horsemen, the horsemen's associations, and the racetracks realize that every claimer and overnight horse out there was once a yearling. If a way out of this dilemma is not found soon we will run into a very serious shortage of horses at our stables and in our races.

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## Ontario Has Agreement With 10 Tracks For Slots

On Wednesday, Jan. 23, the Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corp. issued a press release which stated that it has reached lease agreements in principle for its slots operations at a total of 10 provincial racetracks.

"We are pleased to announce that we have reached lease agreements in principle with 10 gaming sites," OLG president and CEO Rod Phillips was quoted as saying in the release. "We have longstanding and positive relationships with our siteholders and look forward to working with them in the future."

The 10 racetracks that the OLG has reached agreements with in principle are Clinton Raceway, Dresden Raceway, Hanover Raceway, Kawartha Downs, Mohawk Racetrack, Rideau Carleton Raceway, Sudbury Downs, the Western Fair District, Woodstock Raceway and Woodbine Racetrack.

In addition, the Ontario Racing Commission announced that it will now be reporting to the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs, effective immediately.

## Woodbine Responds To Two-Year Agreement

Woodbine Entertainment Group (WEG) on Wednesday confirmed that it has reached an agreement in principle with the Province which ensures the continuation of live horse racing at Woodbine and Mohawk Racetracks for the next two years.

"This long-awaited agreement offers stability while WEG and our partners in horse racing work with government towards a long-term sustainability solution," said Jim Lawson, chairman of the Board of Directors of WEG. "It's clear to us that this is only a short-term fix, and sustainability can only be achieved by the integration of horse racing into the province's gaming strategy. As the largest operator of horse racing in Canada, WEG is committed to working with the government to achieve this critical outcome."

Lawson noted that horse racing has a long and important history in Ontario, and that in recent years the industry has established a business model—and a level of racing excellence—recognized the world over. "Our challenge is to now build a new, sustainable model for horse racing in Ontario that continues to set the standard internationally. I'm confident that working with our partners in industry and government, we can achieve that goal. Our industry deserves nothing less."

WEG held a press conference on Thursday and shortly afterward issued a press release that noted Standardbred purses will continue at current 2013 rates; WEG reduced purses by 10 percent at the beginning of 2013. WEG will be making an application for a total of 183 Standardbred race days at Woodbine (99 dates) and Mohawk (84 dates). The Pepsi North America Cup is on the schedule, but no other stakes were mentioned, or purse amounts.

"I am delighted that at long last, we have been able to provide our fans, industry partners and the horsemen and women of Ontario with more clarity about our 2013 schedule," said Nick Eaves, president and CEO of Woodbine Entertainment Group. "We will continue to work hard to achieve an industry model that will sustain and grow our industry, and this sport, for the long haul."

Eaves noted that while the agreements provide short-term stability, a long-term, sustainable model for WEG and the Ontario horse racing industry could only be achieved by integrating horse racing into the province's overall gaming strategy. He added that a core element of that strategy must be permanent, expanded casinos at Woodbine and Mohawk Racetracks. *(with files from WEG)*

## Winbak Farm Welcomes First Foal



From January to June, Winbak Farm is expected to welcome close to 400 foals. Early Friday morning, Jan. 18, Winbak Farm welcomed its first foal of 2013.

Born at 5 a.m., the colt is by Art Colony and out of the Falcon Seelster mare Pass With Caution p,2, 1:56.4z; 3, 1:54.1; 1:52.4f (\$242,040). Pass With Caution won 26 times before she retired from the track, and is a half-sister to Shake Away p,3, Q1:52; 1:51f (\$376,810).

This is the sixth living foal for Pass With Caution, who has a 100 percent production rate—all of her foals have made it to the races and won. Her offspring in-

cludes Passit p,2, 1:53f; 1:52.4h (\$153,051), Pass The Deuce p,3, 1:53s -'12 (\$68,256) and NYSS contender Caution Signs p,2, Q1:57.2 -'12 (\$21,065). She also has a 2 year old by Totally Western.

The colt is one of the estimated 29 Art Colony foals that will be born in 2013. The ill-fated stallion passed away in Ontario midway through the 2012 breeding season due to heart failure. The foal will be able to be made eligible to the Ontario Sires Stakes program where Winbak Farm has high hopes of him succeeding. *(Winbak Farm)*

## Meadowlands Wagering Is "Through The Roof"

Wagering was absolutely through the roof over the three days of live racing last weekend at the Meadowlands.

Objectively, the comparable weekend in 2012 was compromised by the only significant snowstorm of last winter. However, the total wagered from all sources on Meadowlands races was \$8,184,843 a whopping 29 percent increase from last year. To gain more perspective, the 2013 total was also 28 percent higher than like dates for 2011 and on par with 2010.

"It appears that the changes we made to our wagering format and racing product are continuing to work. Initially, the biggest gains were in our export. Now we have turned our attention to enhancing our live racing experience and the numbers this past weekend reflected that," said racing operations manager Darin Zoccali.

"We have put forth great promotions including 'Captain-treacherous' where already over 1,600 entries have been placed to win a share of the pacer of the year. In the immediate future the Meadowlands racing fans will continue to see enhanced promotion for our live product.

"This Saturday we will be rolling out our \$2 Daily Double Promotion, where racing fans that purchase a live program will receive a free \$2 wager on a Meadowlands Daily Double."

A valuable informational link from The Meadowlands website is the TrackMaster product StatsMaster which offers statistics on all horses, trainers and drivers for the meet and has various sort features.

For example, although Yannick Gingras is the defending dash champ, drives first call for top barn the Burke stable and is certainly a fan favorite at The M, his current Return On Investment (ROI) is a remarkable +30 percent (a 30 percent return on win bets). The 2012 USHWA Driver of the Year Tim Tetrick, on the other hand, is currently sporting a ROI of -64 percent.

Early dash leader Dave Miller has been on some roll and is currently six wins up on Gingras from an equal number of starts. His ROI is just about flat at -1 percent.

Trainer-wise, Ron Burke leads with 11 wins from 78 starts and sends out many heavily bet entries. Revisiting the StatsMaster information, a great disparity exists between Burke's ROI at -32 percent versus hot starter Nick Surick (six wins from 13 starts) whose ROI is whopping +223 percent.

New Meadowlands general manager and CEO Jason Settlemoir had this to say: "The racing since the beginning of the meet has been tremendous. The Racing Office led by Pete Koch has done an outstanding job producing races that are competitive and great to watch.

"Our customer service initiatives, such as the daily promotions, new enhanced Terraces Buffet on Friday and Saturday and free admission and programs on Thursday and Friday have been well received. Those attractions, along with revi-

sions to the wagering format and later post time of 7:15 p.m. are yielding the desired result.

"The handle on the exported signal has been superb and now I can see the on-track handle starting to turn the corner. I am genuinely excited about the progress we are seeing on most fronts. If we get a little help from Mother Nature, Saturday's card featuring the three series finals promises to be an outstanding night of racing." (*Meadowlands*)

## Indiana Senate Committee Approves Table Games

A gambling bill that would allow table games such as blackjack at Hoosier Park and Indiana Downs received unanimous support from an Indiana state Senate committee during a hearing Wednesday. The Public Policy Committee voted 9-0 in favor of the bill, which would also reduce taxes in all Indiana casinos and allow riverboat casinos to move onto land adjacent to their docks.

Casino representatives testified that the bill would help them compete with new competition from Ohio, where three new casinos have opened and a fourth is scheduled to open in March in Cincinnati. Three Indiana riverboats are located just west of Cincinnati.
