### After Scratch, L A Delight Ready To Battle In Matchmaker

The four first-leg winners in the Blue Chip Matchmaker series at Yonkers are scheduled to be back in action this Friday night. Once again there are four legs and the first leg winners—Shartin N, Sell A Bit N, Lady Shadow and Twinkle—won't be facing one another just yet.

There is one notable new face scheduled to compete: L A Delight. The 5-year-old mare was entered in the first leg but was scratched due to sickness. Nancy Johansson trains L A Delight for owner Diamond Creek Racing, which bought the 2014 Jugette winner earlier this year.

"She just wasn't 100 percent last week, and I don't believe a mare like this should have to race if they aren't at the top of their game," said Johansson. "She's staked for the whole year so we didn't want to start her if she wasn't ready. She trained fast on Monday (March 19) to a race bike and she seems really good now."

Driven by Yannick Gingras, L A Delight will start from post 3 in Race 5, a six-horse field that includes first-leg winner Sell A Bit N.

"I know you need luck at Yonkers, and this series is so many legs so you need a lot of things to go your way," said Johansson of her expectations. "You can't beat mares that are just as good as yours if you've got the eight hole."

By starting from post 3, Johansson hopes for a good trip, but admitted she's not sure what that will be.

"If you leave hard at Yonkers and can't clear and sit in the two or three hole, you can get locked in now that they don't have the passing lane," she noted. "But obviously, I'm not driving. That's Yannick's job! He was the (2017) Driver of the Year."

Johansson watched the first Matchmaker leg divisions last Friday and one mare in particular caught her eye: Shartin N. "She was really impressive," said Johansson of Shartin N, who won by 4 1/4 lengths in 1:54.2. Shartin N is trained by Jo-Ann Looney King and her husband Jim King Jr., and is the even-money favorite in Race 4 this Friday. — *By Kathy Parker*

## Chumlee A Looks To Star In Levy

There might be only one person known as "Chumlee" in the United States: Chumlee Russell, the popular guy who toils away at the Gold and Silver Pawn Shop in Las Vegas, the setting for the History Channel's popular reality TV show Pawn Stars.

Harness racing does Chumlee one better as U.S. Trotting Association records show two that bear the name: Chumlee, who was winless in 10 starts as a 2 year old in 2011 for Illinois-based trainer Tim Wilson Jr., and Chumlee A, an Australian-bred son of Somebeachsomewhere trained by Kim Asher.

Chumlee A finished second in his division in last week's

George Morton Levy Memorial Series opening leg at Yonkers Raceway and is back for another try on Saturday night.

Chumlee A will start from post 2 in the first of four \$50,000 Levy divisions (Race 7) with Asher's husband, Larry Stalbaum, in the sulky. While Chumlee A won't have to contend with Mach It So, who bested him by 1 3/4 lengths in the Levy opener, he will have to battle

three who captured their respective Levy splits: Dr. J Hanover, Always At My Place and Bit Of A Legend N.

Despite what looks to be a tough spot on paper, the 7-year-old Chumlee A "caught the eye" of the computer as the automated morning line shows him as the 3-1 second choice behind the 2-1 favorite Dr. J Hanover, who starts from post 1 with Brett Miller driving for trainer Tony Alagna.

Chumlee A had a \$100,490-winning Down Under career before being brought to the U.S. last fall by Stalbaum, who now shares ownership with Mark Jakubik. After capturing a Nov. 11 qualifier at Batavia Downs in his debut, Chumlee A rolled off five consecutive victories, including a then career-best 1:54 effort in the Open Pace at Batavia and a season-ending 1:55.1 score in a top-class event at Monticello.

This year, Chumlee A has four wins and two seconds in nine starts, including a career-best 1:53.2h effort in a \$25,000 overnight over a "sloppy" track at Yonkers on Feb. 24. Chumlee A repeated in the same class the following week (with a purse bump to \$30,000) before finishing fourth by a length in the \$40,000 Open on March 10.

That led into the Levy opener, where Stalbaum left fast from post 6 with Chumlee A to take the lead, and then after settling in the pocket behind Mach It So, could only chase that one across the wire.

While there were five Levy divisions in last weekend's opening leg, the 31 entries for week two were divided

Orillia Joe took his mark of 1:49.4 last year at The Downs at Mohegan Sun Pocono. —

## Dudesalady (Looks Like A Winner)

Areosmith had a big hit in the late 1980s with Dude (Looks Like A Lady) and trainer Bruce Saunders is now hoping he has a big hit in 2018 with the 4-year-old pacing mare Dudesalady. The daughter of Shadow Play will start from post 6 in the last of five \$40,000 divisions of the second leg of the Blue Chip Matchmaker Series on Friday night at Yonkers Raceway.

Dudesalady finished a hard-fought third in her division of the first leg of the Matchmaker last Friday night, putting an end to her three-race win streak. The only time Dudesalady has been off the board in eight starts this year came when she started in a pair of Yonkers overnights from posts seven and eight.

“She worked hard to come first-over and stay as game as she did against those horses,” Saunders said of last week’s show effort by Dudesalady. “She had very casual fractions of a

half in :58.2 and to come first-up against (winner Sell A Bit N), as good as she is. The only thing that was disappointing a little bit was that she wasn’t second, but Medusa found room up the inside to get second.

“I thought she really went a terrific trip, and to me it indicates that under the right set of circumstances she can win a leg of it. I think all the winners have a better resume than she has, but if she keeps advancing I will look forward to racing her against those guys.”

After an 8-5-2-1 freshman campaign, Dudesalady went winless in 18 starts last year, with all but three of those starts coming in Canada, some in Ontario Sires Stakes competition. Saunders has had Dudesalady in his barn only since she wrapped up her sophomore season last year.

“I had seen some of her races where I thought she raced remarkably well, she was just out of position or had no chance whatsoever based on the draw,” remembered Saunders. “I saw a couple of times where they left with her and put her up close to the point and she wasn’t quite good enough some of those days. In the short time we’ve had her, we gave her a little time off and gave her an opportunity to get her metabolism on an even keel. Being able to race in some classes where she was competitive and get a win under her belt, she braved up.”

Dudesalady was purchased (as Solemn Oath) as a yearling for \$40,000 by the Paul family’s M&L of Delaware and Victoria Dickinson. Ralph Paul, the patriarch of the family, died on Feb. 28, with the stable now consisting of his widow, Rosalind, and their son, Doug.

Dudesalady’s dam, Accountable, is a full sister to the 2014 Two-Year-Old Colt Pacer of the Year Artiscape. Her second dam is the great mare Delinquent Account.

Despite the pedigree, Saunders admits he wasn’t sold when Doug Paul nominated Dudesalady to the Matchmaker Series.

“I am a little surprised that she was 0-for-18 last year and was maybe a little skeptical when the Pauls indicated they thought she might be good enough to be in the series,” said Saunders, “but they were right and my skepticism was alleviated her last start or two before the series. And certainly her performance last week indicated she belongs. She’s got a nice future and I hope I’m a part of it.”

Dudesalady will once again have Brent Holland in the sulky. Starting from post 6, she lines up directly to the right of Lady Shadow, who led gate to wire to win her Matchmaker opener in 1:54.3.

“Lady Shadow right inside her will try and go down the road and they’ll mix it up a little bit, and (Dudesalady) will get away fifth or sixth and hopefully get a live flow,” said Saunders of the possible trip for his starter. “I think her best game is chasing horses—getting cover and coming off a helmet—but unfortunately I’m not sure the stretch is long enough at Yonkers for her to capitalize on it.”

The Blue Chip Matchmaker races five preliminary legs with the top eight in the standings advancing to the final on Saturday, April 21. While 32 entries last week were divided equally into four divisions, with 33 starters this week the leg was divided into five splits. —By Gordon Waterstone

## Better Late Than Never For Owner Clyde Perfect

When Clyde Perfect watched his cousin, trainer Ron Potter, win the Little Brown Jug with Big Bad John in 2011, he decided it was time to get involved in harness racing as a horse owner. Perfect—who created the Perfect North Slopes ski area in southern Indiana nearly four decades ago and worked previously as a bricklayer, brick contractor, and farmer—was a mere 78 years young at the time. Perfect North, by the way, is where U.S. Olympic team snowboarder Nick Goepper, a silver medalist, first learned his craft.

“I’m just a rookie in the business,” the now 84-year-old Perfect said with a laugh about his late involvement in harness racing. “When Ron won the Little Brown Jug, I thought, I ought to get one of them and let Ron train it. So that’s what I did.”

Perfect, who lives in Indiana, along the Ohio River west of Cincinnati, raced his first horse in 2013 and has enjoyed his share of success over the years, with 80 wins and nearly \$1.25 million in purses. Male pacer Ollie Pop won a division of the Ohio Breeders Championship and finished third in the Ohio Sires Stakes final as a 2 year old in 2014 and filly pacer Pearl Crush won an Ohio Breeders Championship at age 2 in 2017.

And then there is Zoe Ellasen, named after two of Perfect’s great-granddaughters. The 4-year-old mare pacer has won 13 of 41 races and earned \$245,465 heading into Friday’s \$25,000 Fillies & Mares Open Handicap at Miami Valley Raceway. She is 9-2 on the morning line, with Tyler Smith driving.

Perfect purchased Zoe Ellasen for \$9,500 under the name Evil Woman at the 2015 Ohio Selected Jug Sale. She is a daughter of Santanna Blue Chip out of Spring Delight, who is a full sister to multiple-stakes-winner Bettor’s Edge.

“She was raised by a guy I kind of knew and I didn’t think she was all that expensive, so why not,” Perfect said about buying Zoe Ellasen. “She’s done real well. She’s the best one I’ve had. As long as she keeps doing good we’ll keep going and seeing what she can do.

“Maybe someday she will be a nice broodmare for somebody,” he continued, adding with a laugh, “That’s like buying green bananas, those broodmares.”

Zoe Ellasen’s career wins include multiple divisions of the Ohio Sires Stakes series. She was third in the championship as a 2-year-old and fourth last season at 3. She finished third in last year’s Circle City, which was won by Agent Q, and she competed in the Jugette, finishing fifth in her elimination and missing a trip to the final by a quarter-length.

Perfect expects to have 10 to 12 horses, mostly Ohio bred, in action this year.

“I just enjoy watching the horses race,” he said. “It’s been fun and exciting.” —By Ken Weingartner/USTA

## Another Big Day At Meadows For “Downtown” Brady Brown?

They’re not calling him “Downtown Brown” — not just yet. But if Brady Brown keeps coming from downtown with long-shot winners at The Meadows, the nickname just might stick.

Brown was at it again last Saturday when he roared off the cones late with Lord Of Winterfell to take the Preferred Handicap Pace at a lush 35-1. His two other winners that day were priced at 5-1 — not extreme outsiders but hardly favorites.

Brown will shoot for another big day this Saturday, first post 1:05 p.m., with eight scheduled drives—TG’s Divine Scene (Race 2, post 6), Showing My Hand (Race 3, post 6), Lord of Winterfell (Race 4, post 8), Junior’s Dew (Race 5, post 5), Status Quo (Race 6, post 4), Uncle Bud (Race 7, post 8), Phi Alpha (Race 8, post 8), and One Bad Night (Race 9, post 4). As usual, the morning line odds for some of Brown’s mounts, including 20-1 for Showing My Hand and Junior’s Dew, are sky high.

As a 24 year old still trying to establish himself, Brown sometimes must deal with limited driving opportunities. Still, his ability to get the most from lightly regarded horses is uncanny. In addition to his 35-1 victory last week, he’s scored recently at 56-1 at The Meadows and 101-1 at Northfield Park. Even when he’s not winning, he’s live with longshots. Already this year, he’s finished second 10 times with horses sent off at 9-1 or longer, to the delight of exotics players who kept the faith. He’s also won with three favorites this year, so he’s no one-trick pony.

“I know those odds are more or less because of me,” Brown says. “I’m just starting out and trying to get my feet under me. No matter what the odds are, I’ll use my horse the same way.”

Brown, a Slippery Rock native and resident, got into harness racing through his father, Terry Brown, and grandfather, Robert Brown, who trained and raced horses from their base at the Butler County Fairgrounds.

As a teenager, he started jogging horses for trainer Steve Schoeffel and, in recent years, has become Schoeffel’s go-to guy on the PA Fair circuit. The duo attracted considerable attention in 2015 when they guided Royaltyhasarrived to 10 straight victories and a divisional championship at the fairs and turned him into a fine raceway campaigner as well.

Brown knows that if he continues to succeed, more assignments will come his way.

“I sure hope they do,” he says. “If I keep my head on right and don’t get silly, I think I’ll be all right.”

And Downtown Brown doesn’t care how many light bulbs it takes to display his odds.

“When you see the big numbers up there, it shocks you,” he says. “You know people don’t expect you to win. So when it does happen, it makes me smile a little bit.” —By Evan Pattak/The Meadows

# BREEDING *Banter*

Here's big foaling news! Kathy Parker, the Andover Hall filly who gave me some big thrills on the racetrack, gave birth to her first foal, a colt by Muscle Hill, at 12:38 a.m. Friday, March 16, at Kentuckiana Farms just north of Lexington.

This is the first foal for Kathy Parker, who is owned by breeders Marvin Katz and Al Libfeld. They board their broodmares at Kentuckiana Farms outside of Lexington and about 10 days earlier I had called Kentuckiana's Bob Brady about some other breeding topic and asked when "Kathy"

was due. He told me he had her in the barn, but that she wasn't due until early April.

Brady texted me to share the news of the birth and told me Kathy and her colt (pictured at right) were doing well.

During her racing career Kathy took a mark of 1:56.1 and earned \$372,268, but she could have had a faster record and more money on her card. She rallied to finish second, beaten just a nose, trotting in 1:54.2 in the Jim Doherty Memorial on Hambletonian Day at the Meadowlands in 2015. I was there that day and Kathy was tenacious in late stretch, but you could say she needed a longer nose!

Since Kathy is now a mom, I had to refresh my memory about her maternal line. Her dam is Mallelujah, a daughter of Malabar Man, and the family includes 1994 Hambletonian winner Victory Dream (a son of Kathy Parker's third dam, Crown Dream) and \$1 million winner Liberty Balance (out of Mallelujah's dam Victory Girl).

Over the weekend a winner in Italy was called to my attention. A 3-year-old colt named City Guide won a race in Torino on March 17.

City Guide, who was driven by 77-year-old French horseman J.P. Dubois, is a son of the Dubois-owned stallion Love You and Crys Dream 3, 1:54f. He trotted to a 2:00.2 rated win.

Crys Dream was a top filly in North America in 2010 and 2011, winning seven of eight starts as a 2 year old, among them the Goldsmith Maid and Peaceful Way. Her 3-year-old season was disrupted when she tested positive for a Class 2

anti-depressant (desmethyl-venlafaxine, known under the brand name Pristiq) following her victory in the Elegantimage in mid-June. The New Jersey Racing Commission honored the filly's suspension by the Ontario Racing Commission, but her owners threatened a lawsuit if she was not permitted to compete in the Hambletonian Oaks.

She competed in the Oaks and finished third.

Crys Dream is by Taurus Dream and is out of the Balanced Image mare Crysta's Image. She was campaigned by Dubois in North America and shows just two registered foals, City Guide plus a 4-year-old stallion named Classic Connection (also by Love You). She was bred to Trixton in 2017.

Love You has been bred to American-blooded mares for 15 years. Initially Dubois bred American-blooded mares to Love You. This followed his practice of mixing French and American blood, which has resulted in many champions for the French horseman, among them Love You.

A winner of some of France's top races, Love You carries American blood on both his paternal and maternal lines. His sire, Cocktail Jet, is out of the Super Bowl daughter Armbró Glamour; his granddam on his maternal line is by Speedy Somolli.

Frank Antonacci, who breeds horses under the banner of KR Breeding and Lindy Farms, was the first American breeder to breed a mare to Love You in the U.S. and finally, in 2017, his experimentation delivered a big winner, the top 3-year-old trotting colt International Moni.

With the change in the Kentucky Sires Stakes program to allow eligibility of foals of mares boarded in the state, more breeders have embraced breeding to European stallions, most notably Love You and Ready Cash. In 2017 Love You was bred to 17 mares in North America and Ready Cash was bred to 16.

Lindy Farms bred mares to both Love You and Ready Cash. Highscore Kemp 3, 1:51.4, a sister to the greats Angus Hall, Andover Hall and Conway Hall and the dam of The Perfect Lindy 3, 1:55.3f and Lindy The Great 3, 1:52.1, was bred to both horses and is in foal to Love You. Last year she foaled a colt by Ready Cash. — By Kathy Parker
