Foiled Again Looks For Levy Triple

When Foiled Again won the 2009 and 2010 finals of the George Morton Levy Memorial Series at Yonkers Raceway, he did so after starting respectively from posts 3 and 5. Since those victories Foiled Again hasn't fared as well at the post-position draw for the Levy final, landing posts 6, 8 and 7 over the last three years. Those posts resulted in a third and two seconds.

Having drawn post 3, Foiled Again looks to be in prime position to add a big payday as he works his way toward the unprecedented \$7-million level in career earnings.

Having drawn post 3 in Saturday night's \$567,000 Levy final, the 10-year-old Foiled Again looks to be in prime position to add a big payday as he works his way toward the unprecedented \$7-million level in career earnings. Interestingly, Foiled Again entered

last year's final with \$4.7 million in earnings, but his Pacer of the Year campaign saw him reach the \$6-million mark.

Last year Foiled Again ranked third on the Levy leaderboard heading into the final, behind fellow Ron Burke trainees Something For Doc and Annieswesterncard. Burke sold Something For Doc prior to last year's final, allowing him to race the other pair. There was no need for Burke to do any maneuvering this year as with four prelim victories Foiled Again was tied atop the standings with the P.J. Fraley-trained Mach It So, and Bettor's Edge was third with a trio of prelim wins.

After opening up this year's Levy Series with four consecutive victories, Foiled Again finished sixth in last week's penultimate round after starting from post 7. Driver Yannick Gingras could never get Foiled Again into the flow of the race, so for the first time in 18 starts, Foiled Again missed earning a check. Ironically, the Burke-trained Easy Again upset his stablemate in that Levy split, but landed fourth in the standings and will instead race in the \$100,000 Levy consolation as the series conditions preclude a trainer from starting more than two in the final.

Foiled Again will be coupled in the wagering with Bettor's Edge, who will start from post 6 with George Brennan in the sulky. Brennan was in the bike for the first of Bettor's Edge's three Levy wins in the opening rounds (Gingras drove in the other two victories).

As for Mach It So, who had three wins and two seconds in his five Levy legs, he drew the outside post 8 with Tim Tetrick driving. Stablemate PH Supercam, driven by Jason Bartlett, starts from post 2.

Burke and Fraley each also have a pair of scheduled starters in the \$371,400 Blue Chip Matchmaker Series final on Saturday night. Burke will start Summertime Lea and Rocklamation, who are second and sixth in the series standings, respectively, while Fraley will start Anndrovette and Krispy Apple, who are

Series leader Yagonnakissmeornot, who had four wins and a second in the preliminaries, will start from post 2 for driver Dan Dube. The advantageous post 1 went to the Brian Sears-driven Somwherovrainbow, who posted two wins, one second and one third in her four opening round starts.—By Gordon Waterstone

There's Not An App For That

Six years after Apple famously marketed the iPhone with the phrase, "There's an app for that," one of the few exceptions is a decent one for harness racing. Considering six years in the tech world is an eternity, it's a shameful example of the sport's lack of vision and its failure to unify, market itself, and evolve.

While the recent debate about television vs. social media is interesting—harness racing needs both, of course—the lack of a good app is more glaring, particularly since the younger generation the sport is desperate to attract increasingly es-

chews television in favor of mobile devices and web content.

What harness racing needs is one killer app that allows people to check entries and results, access news, statistics and betting tips, revel in great horses and people from the past, buy souvenirs, link to social media,

set notification alerts, watch races live or on replay and, most importantly, bet on races.

The gold standard is Major League Baseball's At Bat app, which does just about everything except let people bet on the sport. For free, fans can set their favorite team and access scores, schedules, standings, news, videos, statistics and buy tickets or items in the team shop. For about \$20 a year, fans can access the radio feeds for every game played, get video highlights moments after they happen, and receive a condensed video replay package of entire contests hours after the last out. It's about \$25 a month for the premium TV package that allows users to watch every game played in HD on their mobile device, computer or television (using the app as a conduit).

Why not offer a harness racing app with similar levels of service in which users pay a small premium to have complete access to all track feeds? That would help pay for the

development and maintenance of the app, as would the betting option which could kick back a small percentage from every wager placed.


While betting functionality would require cutting through a mess of multi-jurisdictional bureaucracy, it's worth the time and money to hack through. Let's start by exploring partnerships with successful Internet betting outfits such as TVG or the Woodbine Entertainment Group's HorsePlayer Interactive to provide a solution that covers most of North America.

Of course, the rest of the app's content would require the combined efforts of the U.S. Trotting Association and Standardbred Canada or, even better, the consolidation of the two, which is long overdue (a topic for another day, perhaps?)

If the greater industry at large won't do it, then for darn sure an app should be at the top of the list of priorities for whatever gurus are working with the new Ontario Horse Racing group to brand and market all horse racing in the province to the world.

I'm not naive about this. Putting such an app together won't be easy, especially in a fractious industry that turns even the most logical decisions into political hockey pucks. But harness racing is already six years or more behind the curve on this one, folks, which makes us dinosaurs roaming aimlessly in the digital age.

Of course, a comprehensive, easy-to-use harness racing app will be expensive to produce, but not nearly as costly as continued inaction.

Holloway Has Triple Threat In Reynolds

Trainer Joe Holloway will send out Stratos Hanover and The Lunch Pail as a coupled entry in Saturday night's \$49,015 W.N. Reynolds Memorial for 3-year-old male pacers at the Meadowlands, plus Always B Miki. Nine sophomores will line up behind the gate in Race 3 on the card as the Reynolds returns to the stakes schedule after a one-year absence as a result of a lack of entries last year.

Both sons of Yankee Cruiser, Stratos Hanover and The Lunch Pail are owned by Michael Ouriel of Webster, N.Y., who has been in the business only a few years after retiring from the auto parts industry. Ouriel paid \$40,000 for Stratos Hanover at Harrisburg, while he only recently purchased The Lunch Pail from Andy and Julie Miller.

After a two-win freshman campaign, Stratos Hanover has two victories in three starts this year, including a career-best 1:51.4 effort last time out on April 10 at Harrah's Philadelphia. He will start from post 2 with driver David Miller.

"He's gotten better this year," Holloway said of Stratos Hanover, who has career earnings of \$51,551. "It was a good mile he went last week and he's trained good. I think he'll be more (Pennsylvania) Sires Stakes than the Stallion Series. I'm happy with him so far. He's a secondary-type colt and if he could go around and hit some of the 'B' stakes and some of the Sires Stakes, he has a chance to make some money."

The Lunch Pail won twice in six starts last year, including a career-best 1:51.3 clocking at Harrah's Philadelphia. Holloway also trained The Lunch Pail's sister, the \$539,788-winning Marty Party, who was purchased in part by Ouriel in 2013.

After a pair of impressive wins in early-March qualifiers at the Meadowlands for the Millers, Ouriel made the purchase. Holloway said he looked at The Lunch Pail as a possible buy at the Lexington Selected Yearling Sale, but deferred because of his diminutive size.

"I didn't buy him as a yearling because I thought he was too small," remembered Holloway. "He's an honest horse

and he did good for Andy and Julie, but his size has to hurt him. He's even smaller than the 2-year-old (full brother) I have. Just like Stratos, I'll be happy with the Sires Stakes and some of the secondary stakes."

Holloway also in part purchased The Lunch Pail's full brother, Bruiser Cruiser, as a yearling last fall for \$65,000.

"I have to keep (breeder) Schare Adams in the business," Holloway said with a laugh.

As for Always B Miki, the son of Always A Virgin is a half brother to Yagonnakiss-meornot, the favorite in Saturday night's Matchmaker final at Yonkers Raceway. A two-time winner last year, Always B Miki came out of the box ready this year as he fired off an impressive 1:51 victory in his season debut April 12 at the Meadowlands, closing out the mile with a last quarter of :26 flat.



With named driver Corey Callahan opting off to drive Pennsylvania Sires Stakes champion Allstar Partner, Holloway turned to Yannick Gingras. The pair start from post 9.

"He raced pretty good last time out but he really only paced an eighth of a mile," said Holloway. "At the head of the stretch when they started calling on him, Corey tapped him and he took off. And then he had him shut down on the wire.

"This is a test to see if he's good enough to stick around for the stakes like the Meadowlands Pace and North America Cup, or go to Indiana for the Sires Stakes." — By Gordon Waterstone

Kayla Grace Brings Perfect Record To Courageous Lady

She's the not fastest of the six 3-year-old filly pacers entered in Friday night's \$110,000 Courageous Lady at Northfield Park, nor is she the richest, but she is certainly the winningest.

Starting from post 3 with Brad Kramer driving, Kayla Grace will put her perfect 15-for-15 career record on the line in what will be the first big test of her career after dominating her peers in her home state of Michigan.

Marie "Ginny" St. Charles trains Kayla Grace for her husband, Kevin, and Ed and Cheryl Sayfie's ECS Racing. St. Charles said she originally nominated the unbeaten daughter of He's All That to the five-leg Wallflower Series that got underway Thursday night at Northfield, but when she found out the Courageous Lady conditions allow for a \$10,000 supplemental entry fee, she wrote the check.

"This is a \$10,000 test run," said St. Charles. "I put up the money to see if she's worth racing. I just had a horse claimed off me for \$10,000, so it seemed like a sign."

St. Charles said because of lesser competition in the Wolverine State, Kayla Grace has pretty much cake-walked her way through all 15 starts, including on the fair circuit. She was 12-for-12 last year as a 2 year old as she earned \$62,277, and has added three more wins this year to bring her career bankroll to \$69,277. Kayla Grace's unblemished record led Northfield Park director of racing Dave Bianconi to tab her the 3-1 morning-line choice.

Thus far, when Kayla Grace has raced, the photo finish camera operator pretty much could have taken a break. No horse came within 2 1/2 lengths of her last year. Her last start at Hazel Park on April 18 was her closest encounter as she scored by just 1 1/2 lengths. Her wins include a 15 1/4-length romp in last year's Michigan Sires Stakes (MISS) final and a 22 1/2-length blowout in the Michigan Breeders final, both at Hazel Park.

"I don't know if she's good enough, but we'll find out," said St. Charles, who has trained 13 Michigan champions over her career. "If you don't enter you'll never know, and if you don't go outside of Michigan you'll never know if you have any stock or not. I do think she is a nice filly though."

Kramer said Kayla Grace's second win this year—her career-best 1:55.1 effort while winning by 12 lengths on April 13 at Hazel Park—made him a believer.

"I didn't know how good she was until that race when we had the nine hole and we went right to the front in

:28 flat and then had to put away a horse on the outside and then come home in :27.3," said Kramer. "That's impressive."

While Kayla Grace's domination has led her to race on the lead virtually every time, Kramer said he believes she might be better off the pace.

"I think she will be better off a helmet and maybe in the Courageous Lady she will have a chance to do that," he said. "She's just so good since she can leave strong and finish stronger."

St. Charles said having regular driver Kramer also making the trip to Northfield gives her some sense of security.

"Brad decided to come drive her so I have her best teammate up on her," she said.

St. Charles said Kayla Grace's only current stakes engagements besides the Michigan Colt Stakes circuit include the Hanover, Cinderella and Circle City. — *By Gordon Waterstone*

Stall Occupied By Greyhound Moving To Goshen

When the great gray trotter, Greyhound, won the 1935 Hambletonian at Goshen, N.Y.'s GoodTime Park, America was emerging from the Great Depression. As he walked into his retirement home, a stall at the Maple Park, Ill., farm of his trainer, Doc Flanery, in 1940, the world was on the brink of a great world war.

The gray gelding, who at one time held 14 world records, turned nearly white as he aged. Greyhound's connections, Flanery and Baker, enhanced his legacy with an ongoing tour of tracks after his retirement. Typically adorned with a red blanket and red painted hooves, to show off his stark white color, he was a crowd favorite wherever he went.



When he was taken from his stall at Flanery's farm for the last time, after his death at age 33 in 1965, the world and the sport of harness racing had changed dra-

matically, but the reverence in which the "Grey Ghost" was held by fans never waned.

On Friday, May 2, the stall Greyhound called home for the last 25 years of his life will arrive at the Harness Racing Museum & Hall of Fame in Goshen, where it will be preserved for generations to come.

Life in the 15-foot-by-30-foot stall was plush, surrounded by one-inch tongue and groove oak paneling on all four walls and ceiling. The lighting was recessed, with a Dutch door and an opening for Greyhound to lean over and join the company of those that visited him from an adjacent sitting room which displayed photos and memorabilia from his career.

One of the 15-foot walls of the stall contained a more than life size photograph of Greyhound trotting right at the camera. It was a sanctuary and a virtual palace befitting a cherished and charismatic champion. Long after Greyhound's death and that of his trainer, the farm stayed in family ownership, leasing the facilities to other Standardbred breeders.

It was then that friends and horsewomen Jan Heine and Nancy Brejc got involved, caring for horses from the early 1990s on for Standardbred breeder Dr. Ken Walker, as well as subsequent lessees. The farm was then and is now owned by the estate of Flanery's widow. The stall and the adjoining sitting room were meticulously cared for by Dr. and Mrs. Walker during those years.

"That was back in the early 1980s," said Heine. "We were both working for the Walkers. After they left, I kept tabs on the place and they kept the stall intact, but some of his items went missing; the Hambletonian trophy and a blanket with his hair on it made it to a museum in St. Charles. The third lessee, who's been there for 17 years, watched over it as well.

"Last year I caught wind that they were leveling the farm, so my friend and I were going back and forth about trying to acquire the wood and everything that was in the stall. Finally we went in and took each and every board, numbered it. It's solid oak and the sitting room is knotty pine. Now we're getting ready to make a road trip."

The road trip will conclude at the Harness Racing Museum & Hall of Fame in Goshen. "Greyhound is, without question, one of our greatest and best loved equine heroes," said Museum director Janet Terhune. "We're delighted for the opportunity to recreate Greyhound's stall and adjacent sitting room and to share them with visitors.

"Considering Greyhound's association with Goshen, having won the Hambletonian at GoodTime Park and time trialed at both GoodTime Park and Goshen Historic Track, the Museum is the perfect site for this wonderful artifact of his life.

"The enthusiasm and dedication that these two women, Nancy Brejc and Jan Heine, have for Greyhound and this significant piece of trotting history are wonderful and we applaud them for it.

"There is no doubt that funding this project and finding the necessary space to fulfill this vision are challenging goals, but I believe that there are many people out there who will support it," added Terhune. Saturday's Olympic Trot An Elitlopp Preview

On Saturday, the prestigious Olympic Trot takes place at the Aby Racetrack in Gothenburg, Sweden. A portion of the betting handle goes to support the training of the Swedish Olympic team.

The Olympic Trot final field is determined by qualification races and the winners, Solvato, Sanity and Noras Bean, were not fortunate in the post position draw, receiving numbers 6, 7 and 10 in the line-up. The Norwegian-trained star Yarrah Boko got post 8 and is certainly facing a tough task as well.

The big outsider in the field, EdYou, who grabbed the last qualifying ticket to the final last Sunday, got a favorable draw, along with the Finnish threat Brad de Veluwe and Lutfi Kolgjini's champion Raja Mirchi, who might be remembered by U.S. trotting fans for competing in the Peter Haughton Memorial at the Meadowlands.

The purse to the winner of the Olympic Trot is 1.5 million Swedish crowns, or about \$227,000.



Gingras, Dube Talk Levy, Matchmaker

Yannick Gingras will drive morning-line favorite Foiled Again from post 3 in Saturday night's \$567,000 George Morton Levy Memorial Series final at Yonkers Raceway, the same starting spot he has with Rocklamation in the \$371,400 Blue Chip Matchmaker Series final. The morning-line choice in that final is Yagonnakissmeornot, who will start from post 2 with driver Daniel Dube. In interviews with Harness Racing Communications' Ken Weingartner, Gingras and Dube talk about their horses.

Gingras, Foiled Again:

"There's no pressure. I'm excited to race him."

Gingras, Rocklamation:

"She's been really good. She can't do the dirty work, so post three should be a good spot. We've got the two best horses inside of us and we can see who is going to cut the mile and maybe get a good trip. She had a week off and she's usually very good when she's fresh."

Dube, Yagonnakissmeornot:

"She's been doing everything right. With an inside post, it should be good. But she can race anyway you want; she doesn't need a trip. (Last week) I had to ask her a little on the backside, but at the wire she could have still done another lap. She can make the other (horses) tired. She can grind and keep going. She can kind of be on the lazy side, but if you ask for a little more, she gives you more."

National Debt Back In Action Saturday

The undefeated National Debt will no doubt get the bulk of attention from the betting public on Saturday evening when he contests the lone division of the Diplomat Series at Woodbine. The son of Allamerican Native-Our Inheritance remains a perfect six-for-six in his career, but comes into the Diplomat after a break since March 8, when he won the \$60,500 Buddy Gilmour Memorial at the Meadowlands.

National Debt recently shipped north to Canada from the U.S. and into the care of veteran conditioner Bob Young from previous trainer Ron Coyne.

"I've had him roughly a month today (Wednesday, April 23)," Young said. "He's trained once at Woodbine and schooled twice and it's all systems go for Saturday. He's had a really good month and settled in well."

National Debt was a \$17,000 yearling purchase for Kelly Hoerd and Blair and Erna Corbeil of Edmonton, Alberta. After going a perfect four-for-four last year in Alberta, Hoerd and Corbeil elected to send their stable star to Coyne in New Jersey at the start of this season to prepare for the Gilmour Series. Prior to the series sweep, Jerry and Theresa Silva joined the ownership group following a private purchase.

Although National Debt will make his first appearance on Ontario soil, it isn't the first time Young has laid eyes on the horse.

"I saw him as a yearling after he was bought because he shipped to Mohawk then on to Edmonton to Kelly and Blair's," Young said. "I thought he looked a lot like his brother, Grin For Money (\$476,632 - 1:49.4), but was a taller horse with more leg. Same type of head and stood well and very well built like his brother."

After getting acquainted with the speedy pacer over this past month, Young admits that he likes what he sees in the North America Cup prospect.

"He's very easy on himself and looked after himself very well," he said. "I wanted to train him this morning at 9 a.m., but he was sleeping so we waited for him to get up. That's just the type of horse he is. He's very laid back."

"He gets over the ground very easy; he has a great attitude and is versatile," Young continued. "He doesn't need to be put on the front; he tracks cover really well and has a great kick to him."

With the \$1.5 million Pepsi North America Cup less than two months away, Young certainly has the June 14 date marked on his calendar.

"To have a top horse like National Debt in the barn is really something special. All we can do is take it week-by-week and do our best to make sure he's at his best, Young continued. "It said a lot about him when he won the Gilmour in (1):50. The question remains if he can go in (1):47 or (1):48 and be an elite 3 year old. We know he can go in (1):50 and hopefully there is another two seconds or so in him. Until he does it, we don't know."

Following the North America Cup, National Debt will once again return to the U.S.

"After The Diplomat he doesn't have anything to the Somebeachsomewhere then the North America Cup. After that he'll go back to Ronnie (Coyne) in the U.S. and get ready for more stakes down there," added Young.

National Debt will begin from post seven in the lone \$20,000 division of The Diplomat in Race 3 on Saturday evening. Sylvain Filion is scheduled to drive. (WEG)

Hambletonian Highlights Big M Championship Meet

The 2014 Championship Meet at the Meadowlands will offer over \$9 million in purses for its stakes races, headlined by the \$1.2 million Hambletonian on Saturday, Aug. 2. Carrying a \$1.2 million total purse, the Hambletonian is the richest Standardbred race in North America and will be the first jewel of the trotting Triple Crown in 2014. This year's Hambletonian will be the first in the new \$100 million Meadowlands Racing & Entertainment facility.

New to the 2014 stakes calendar is the \$400,000 Hambletonian Maturity for 4-year-old trotters, to be contested at 1 1/8th miles on Saturday, July 5, which is Meadowlands Pace elimination night. A maximum of 16 horses could start in the \$400,000 event.

Other major events are the Arthur J. Cutler Memorial, to take place on Saturday, May 17, and will coincide with Roosevelt Raceway Legacy Night. The New Jersey Sires Stakes Championships for 3 year olds will be on Saturday, May 31, and the Meadowlands Maturity Pace on Friday, June 13, which is likely to mark the 2014 debut of Captaintreachorous, the 2013 Pacer of the Year.

Andy Miller: "I Will Be Back"

Driver Andy Miller, seriously injured in an April 15 race accident at Yonkers Raceway, told harnessracing.com that despite the prognosis of six months of recovery time, "The upside of it is that I am going to be back. This is not a career-ending injury."

Miller, 45, broke a pair of lumbar vertebrae in his back after Marmara Denzi, the horse he was driving in the first race that night, hooked wheels with the fallen George Brennan-driven In The Clear. While Brennan was unhurt, Miller was catapulted from the sulky.

"I hooked his wheel and it launched me in the air," said Miller. "I remember landing and being in excruciating pain. I landed right on my butt and I knew something seriously was wrong because I couldn't move."

Miller underwent eight hours of surgery the following morning at Columbia Presbyterian Hospital in New York City, a procedure that included removing bone fragments that were perilously close to his spine.

"There were bone fragments up against my spine but they don't think there was any damage," said Miller, who was released from the hospital on Monday night. "The doctors think that once it all heals it will be very stable."

Miller spoke to harnessracing.com from his home in Millstone Township, N.J., on Tuesday morning.

"I had a decent night and I just got back after taking a walk and a shower, which was my first in a week," said Miller, who is wearing a back brace. "That felt really good. I'm back in bed now and it was nice to go for a walk because it is so nice outside. The doctors told me to do all the walking I want."

Miller has been able to watch races on his iPad, but he says the worst part is not being at Gaitway Farm to help his wife, Julie, with their 45 horses.

"They want me to keep walking, so maybe in a week or two I could take a ride to the barn and watch the horses train," said Miller, who has 8,054 career wins and \$100.9 million in purse earnings. "It just depends on how tired I get with the little walks here at home. I really hate missing racing and being there for all our horses and everybody else's horses that I've been racing." — *harnessracing.com*

Will She Be "That Woman" In Courageous Lady?

After watching That Woman Hanover recover from a mid-season slump and finish 2013 with three consecutive wins, trainer Dan Altmeyer is looking forward to the filly's 3-year-old campaign.

That campaign begins Friday when That Woman Hanover faces five foes in the \$110,000 Courageous Lady Stakes for 3-year-old filly pacers at Northfield Park in Ohio. That Woman Hanover, driven by Altmeyer's son-in-law, Mike Wilder, drew post No. 6 and is 4-1 on the morning line.

Last year, That Woman Hanover won her first two races, including a \$30,000 division of the Pennsylvania All Stars, before hitting a five-race skid during which she finished no better than fifth. Altmeyer said the slump was the result of equipment issues, not any physical ailments, and That Woman Hanover rebounded to win her final three starts.

"She started out great and then she hit some bumps in the road and it took us a while to get it figured out," said Altmeyer, who owns That Woman Hanover with Richard Kelson, Jack Piatt II, and Jeffrey Altmeyer.

That Woman Hanover prepped for the Courageous Lady with two qualifiers, winning the second in 1:54.2 at The Meadows.


