Wiggle It Jiggleit Solid NA Cup Favorite

Things have gone so smoothly this year for Wiggle It Jiggleit and his connections, it's almost scary. The 3-year-old gelded son of Mr. Wiggles has barely broken a sweat in 2015 as he has steamrolled through his competition, scoring 10 straight victories to stretch his career unbeaten streak to 11 dating back to last year.

If there were any doubts as to Wiggle It Jiggleit's ability to step up in class into open stakes competition, they were certainly all erased in last weekend's Pepsi North America Cup eliminations at Mohawk Racetrack. With Montrell Teague driving the odds-on favorite, Wiggle It Jiggleit turned on the afterburners with a front-end back half of :52.4 to draw clear of his rivals by six lengths in 1:49.2.

The effort made Wiggle It Jiggleit the 8-5 morning-line favorite for Saturday night's \$1 million NA Cup final.

"To see a horse come a back half in :52.4 with a third quarter in :27 flat, I was impressed, as I always am with him," said owner George Teague Jr., who trained and co-owned 2006 NA Cup champ Total Truth but turned the training responsibilities of Wiggle It Jiggleit over to longtime assistant Clyde Francis.

By winning his NA Cup elim, Wiggle It Jiggleit's connections—as well as those of the other elim winners InThe Arsenal and Wakizashi Hanover—earned the right to pick a post for the rich final. Wiggle It Jiggleit's name came out of the box first at the Tuesday afternoon press luncheon held at Mohawk, and Francis chose post 3. Post 5 then went to InThe Arsenal, with Jim King Jr., husband of trainer Joanne Looney King, picking post 2 for their contender Wakizashi Hanover.

While those three are the program favorites, right behind as fourth choice is Artspeak, the reigning divisional champ

in both the U.S. and Canada, who finished second to Wakizashi Hanover and landed the outside post 10 in the open draw among the other seven finalists.

“It looks like a safe place, inside but not too close to the rail,” Montrell Teague, 24, the son of George Teague, said of choosing post 3.

For the most part, the younger Teague has used front-end strategy for Wiggle It Jiggleit’s races, including the NA Cup elim where he went to the front from post 5 in a :26.2 quarter (with second choice Hurrikane Ali tucked behind), and then slowed the tempo down considerably with a :30.1 second quarter. After the half in :56.3, Wiggle It Jiggleit sizzled home as he won easily over runner-up Arque Hanover. Hurrikane Ali faded to fourth but still earned a spot in the final.

Teague was fined \$500 by the track stewards for “failing to set a pace comparable to class.” While Teague said he expected the fine, he also didn’t expect that his peers wouldn’t mount a challenge.

“They didn’t want to come first-up and get tired chasing him, but I didn’t expect to get a :30 quarter and then not get anybody up,” said Teague. “It didn’t mess the race up (the slow second quarter) but for that caliber of horse you should go faster. (The back half) didn’t seem I was going that fast because he was going so easy.”

Teague said in all likelihood he will have Wiggle It Jiggleit forwardly placed early in Saturday’s NA Cup final, but if the situation develops differently, he will be prepared.

Sears Has Won NA Cup From Post 5 Before

Driver Brian Sears will be trying for his third North America Cup victory when he lines up behind the starting gate with InThe Arsenal, already the winner of the Rooney final and his NA Cup elimination on Saturday night at Mohawk Racetrack.

Sears won his first NA Cup 10 years ago, with Rockroll Hanover. It was an easy win for the colt who was the betting favorite in the race and went on to earn Horse of the Year honors.

In the 2005 NA Cup, Sears and Rockroll Hanover started from post 5. They were in control of the race just past the opening quarter (:25.4) and then followed with :28.4 and :29.1 middle fractions before the colt kicked home in :26 for a 1:49.4 score.

In 2004 Sears had tried to win the NA Cup while starting from post 4 with another betting favorite, Georgia Pacific. He put

the big-striding colt in the outer flow of the race but in the rush to the wire they ended fifth, beaten only one length by the winner, Mantacular, who edged Metropolitan by a head.


Last year Sears won the Cup with JK Endofanera and in a 12-1 shocker to the bettors, got the job done with a second-over trip after starting from post 9.

After the Wiggle It Jigglet it camp won the draw to select a post position first and chose post 3, the connections of InThe Arsenal took post 5, and Sears likes the spot.

“That’s a good spot; it’s high percentage,” noted Sears of the winningest post on the Mohawk oval at 15.3 percent for pacing races there through June 16. (Post 6 is second highest at 14 percent.)

“It’s an interesting field of horses,” added Sears while driving home from Yonkers early Tuesday evening. “My horse is sharp. He’s doing everything right.”

Sears believes the field has enough talent that the trip might dictate the winner.

“It’s always fun to work out a golden trip, and some might think that’s second-over, but the game is very front-end oriented today,” he offered. “Last year they raced every quarter and that made the race for me.” — By Kathy Parker

Artspeak Hopes To Speak Loudly From Post 10

When JK Endofanera won last year's \$1 million Pepsi North America Cup final from post 9, he became just the second horse in Cup history to win from that slot, joining 1999 champ The Panderosa. While JK Endofanera's effort may bode well for the nine hole, it didn't change the fact that post 10 remains the sole starting slot that has never produced a NA Cup winner.

The responsibility of trying to change that this year in Saturday night's contest falls on Artspeak, who arguably is the strongest horse to land the outside starting spot in the 32-year history of the NA Cup. The reigning divisional champ in both the U.S. and Canada, Artspeak finished second in his NA Cup elim to Wakizashi Hanover, whose connections earned the right to choose their post and selected post 2.

"It's not the worst thing in the world," Artspeak's driver Scott Zeron said about drawing post 10 in the open draw among the seven non-elim winners. "I know what Artspeak is capable of and it will impress people even more when he wins. He can handle anything." Zeron is transparent when it comes to race strategy behind the son of Western Ideal trained by Tony Alagna, who won the 2013 NA Cup with Captaintreacheraus.

have to do a lot more work than we anticipated, but at the same time I'm excited about it.

"I don't think my horse has lost any respect, definitely not in my eyes. All that happened last week was that Wiggle It Jiggleit gained a lot of respect. That's all."

Before we continue looking at Saturday's final, we need to look back at last weekend's elims, which were won by Wiggle It Jiggleit, In The Arsenal and Wakizashi Hanover, who out-closed Artspeak down the stretch to win by 1 3/4 lengths in 1:49.2.

Zeron left with his colt and then settled in fifth in the first turn and remained there, patiently, while there was a shuffling of the deck in front. Turning for home, Artspeak was still fifth and even though he paced a last quarter in :26.1, he was out-sprinted by the :25.3 final panel by Wakizashi Hanover.

"It was going absolutely perfect until Randy (Waples, with SplitThe House), pulled the two hole," remembered Zeron. "When he pulled it completely jammed up the flow and I had to ask my horse to turn speed on a dime when I tipped him out four wide. I give the other horse (Wakizashi Hanover) credit as he flipped gears way faster than I could ever. I was going just as fast—if not faster—than him at the wire.

"I wasn't worried at the end of the mile that my horse wasn't capable of that win, it was just circumstances led to the other horse getting a length jump on me. That cost us picking our post and it's disappointing in that way."

Artspeak has been installed the 5-1 fourth choice on the morning line, behind the three elim winners.

Zeron admits he was impressed with Wiggle It Jiggleit, who also won in 1:49.2, with a blazing back half of :52.4 after an opening half of :56.3 when nobody challenged the eventual winner on the lead.

"It's almost a kamikaze mission," said Zeron on why no one pulled on Wiggle It Jiggleit. "If I was sitting third or fourth in that race I would have come with Artspeak, but you can't come with a second-rate horse in those races. The horses that were sitting behind him, they were there for a reason. The way (Wiggle It Jiggleit) turns speed he would have hung them out with no problem.

"Judges regulate that stuff and we get into a lot of trouble if we try and slow the fractions down like that. I would have been worried I put my horse to sleep, but give (Teague) credit. His horse can do anything. You can get caught sleeping trying to be clever like that."

Zeron said he doesn't expect slow fractions in Saturday's final.

"That definitely won't be happening, that's for sure. I think Montrell is confident enough in his horse that he could go a little bit of fractions this week. I'm sure he's confident he can't be beat," Zeron concluded with a laugh. — *By Gordon Waterstone*

JK She'salady Looks To Rebound Off First-Ever Loss

Except for possibly as a result of an injury, it's extremely rare when a driver change is made during the racing season on an eventual Horse of the Year. But that was the case last year when Yannick Gingras, who had directed the 2-year-old filly pacer JK She'salady to 10 consecutive victories—including the Three Diamonds and She's A Great Lady finals—picked off prior to the Breeders Crown to drive Sassa Hanover.

With Gingras opting for the Ron Burke-trained Sassa Hanover, trainer Nancy Johansson turned to Tim Tetrick, who directed the filly to wins in her Breeders Crown elim and final, which brought her freshman slate to 12-for-12 and honors as the 2014 Horse of The Year.

Sassa Hanover finished second in both Crown attempts behind JK She'salady, which led to second-guessing of Gingras's decision.

The two fillies met up for the first time since the Crown in last weekend's eliminations for the \$479,000 Fan Hanover at Mohawk Racetrack, but the third time was a charm for Sassa Hanover as she came up victorious in a career-best 1:49.4. It was the first-ever loss for JK She'salady, who finished 2 ¾ lengths behind in fourth after being parked from the half.

Following the race, Johansson said JK She'salady scoped slightly sick. Tetrick said he could sense JK She'salady was off a bit.

"I could feel she wasn't 100 percent," said Tetrick. "Especially when she lost her cover, she just didn't swell up like she normally does. She still held tough and didn't pack it in, and got into the final."

Tetrick is optimistic for a JK She'salady rebound, noting the daughter of Art Major landed post 5 in the open draw among the eight non-elim winners. Burke chose post 3 for Sassa Hanover while trainer Tony O'Sullivan selected post 2 for Moonlit Dance, who won the second Fan Hanover elim in 1:50.4.

"I think you will see a different horse this week," said Tetrick, who has three Fan Hanover titles to his credit (2009 Not Enough, 2012 American Jewel and 2013 I Luv The Nitelife). "(Post 5) is a great starting spot. It is what it is though, you go with what they give you and do the best you can."

Despite the victory, Sassa Hanover is listed as the 7-2 second choice on the morning line behind the 9-5 JK She'salady. Gingras said his former mount deserves pre-race favorite status.

"She was sick and she's still the one to beat," Gingras said of JK She'salady. "The winner's circle still goes through JK She'slady."

"We got a good trip (last week) but I always said (Sassa Hanover) could go with her. It was a tough call I had to make last year," added Gingras, who won the 2006 Fan Hanover with Darlin's Delight. — *By Gordon Waterstone*

Three-Time NA Cup Winner Lachance Slips Into Retirement

In the last race on a Saturday afternoon card at The Red Mile last October, Mike Lachance steered Propulsion to a 20-1 upset in a \$10,000 late closer. He performed the obligatory winner's circle functions, tucked his whip away and walked off past the railbird seats—all business, as is his custom — into a Lexington autumn sunset.

There was no fanfare or big announcement. For sure there wasn't a retirement party. He's not much for a fuss.

Lachance simply did his job, as he has for 47 years, and left. Time will tell if it was the last drive, and the 10,421st and final win of his Hall of Fame career.

Lachance, who has been helping his son Patrick train horses, is heading to Toronto this weekend to visit another son, Martin.

There he will sit behind a 2 year old he shares ownership of with Martin.

"He said, 'Dad, come and try him.' So, I'm going to spend some time with him. He has a little boy that's a year old," Lachance said.

You can almost hear him smile over the phone.

Lachance, who is now 64, also plans on heading to Mohawk Saturday night for this year's 32nd annual \$1 million Pepsi North America Cup, a race he has won three times (Bettor's Delight in 2001, Straight Path in 1998 and Safely Kept in 1992). Only John Campbell, with six NA Cup final victories to his credit, has won the signature race more times than Lachance.



Safely Kept wins the 1992 North America Cup at Greenwood Raceway in 1:53.1 for driver Mike Lachance at odds of 30-1. It was the first of three Cup victories for the Hall of Famer. Lachance also won the 1998 NA Cup with Straight Path and the 2001 renewal with Bettor's Delight, both at Woodbine.

In all, Lachance has driven in eight North America Cup finals, the last coming in 2003.

Lachance amassed a resume that puts him in a very small group of the greatest to ever sit behind a horse—over \$190 million in earnings (still third most all-time) plus, 27 Breeders Crowns, five Little Brown Jugs, four Hambletonians, two Meadowlands Pace victories and many, many more. Lachance is enshrined in both the U.S. Harness Racing Hall of Fame and the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame.

He said he was fortunate not to have too many bad accidents, lucky to have driven some of the sport's greatest horses — far too many to list here — for some of the sport's greatest people. At the top of his list is George Segal.

"There is no better owner than George Segal. There were maybe some just as good as him, but nobody better than him," said Lachance, who won three Hambletonians for Segal. "He is the best person in the world to drive for. With young horses he never wants you to abuse them. He always wants you to take care of them. There was no mistake in driving for George Segal. That is a great guy."

WAKIZASHI HANOVER (Post 2)

"We're in a good spot. This gives me options, if I want to follow somebody in the right spot or I want to leave and follow Montrell's horse (Wiggle It Jiggleit). A lot of people are (going to want to follow), but at the end of the day, if it's a hot pocket too fast, then it's not a good spot to be in" —driver *Tim Tetrick*



BETTING EXCHANGE (Post 4)

"I think that's a great spot for him. I've never left huge with him, but he can hold his position. I think the 8, 9 or 10 would have been a terrible disadvantage. I think we have a chance to get a good piece of it. They tell me he's had a great week so far. Now we just need luck!" —driver *David Miller*

YANKEE BOUNTY (Post 6)

"I was really happy with him in the elim. He paced all the way to the wire. He had thrown in a bad start at The Meadows (a seventh-place finish) the race before. I should be able to follow a horse that's going to put me in the race. To say he's going to win, that might be a stretch. Personally, I don't think anyone can go with Wiggle It Jiggleit. He's just so fast, and whenever he wants it, the speed is there. He's both quick and handy. I'm just going to try to trip my horse out!" —driver *Corey Callahan*

ARQUE HANOVER (Post 7)

"I was actually real happy with the 7. I love the 6 at Mohawk, but this is fine. My last two NA Cups I won elims with both McWicked and Vegas Vacation and we got to pick our posts, and then we ended up first-over in the final and so that didn't work out. I'd love to see a second-over trip, but we're all looking for that. —
trainer Casie Coleman, whose colt Arque Hanover raced first-over in Wiggle It Jiggleit's :27 third quarter in an NA Cup elim

HURRIKANE ALI (Post 8)

"He's in a tough spot, no doubt about it. He's had a couple bad efforts and hopefully John (trainer John McDermott) can get him right. He was fourth in the New Jersey Sires Stakes final and was no good, and he was no good last week (fourth in his elim)!" —driver *Yannick Gingras*

PENJI HANOVER (Post 9)

"I would have loved to have drawn inside. Believe me when I say, I've talked to Chris (Christoforou) and there is no way this horse is going to sit last. He gets off the gate good, and we may not be challenging Wiggle It Jiggleit at the start, but we will be part of the race. I've raced him twice now (Paul Kelley previously trained Penji Hanover for W. Springtime Racing) and he's come out of the race fresh. Last week in the elimination, if we got out at the top of the lane with this horse, I say we could have been a winner!" (Penji Hanover finished second, beaten one-half length, by In The Arsenal.) —trainer *Ben Wallace*

EBC Finals On Tap Sunday At Vernon

A pair of Empire Breeders Classic (EBC) finals headline the Sunday afternoon card at Vernon Downs, with nine 3-year-old filly trotters vying for a purse of \$248,275 and 11 sophomore male trotters aiming at a purse of \$255,325.

Barn Doll looms the likely favorite in the EBC 3FT final for co-owner and trainer Steve Pratt and driver Jeff Gregory. The daughter of Conway Hall is the reigning New York Sires Stakes (NYSS) champion and has already posted three wins and a second in four starts this year. Barn Doll won her EBC elim last Sunday in a career-best 1:52.1, drawing clear of her peers with a final quarter of :27.3 to win by 2 ½ lengths.

Barn Doll will start from post 4 on Sunday, with the final slated as Race 7 (approximate post 3:15 p.m.). Katniss, who won the second EBC elim in 1:53, will line up in post 2 for driver Daniel Dube.

Trained by Ake Svanstedt, Katniss was unraced at two but has made eight starts in 2015 at six different racetracks. Katniss is a full sister to Dejarmbro, and her dam is a half-sister to Manofmanymissions.

With 11 three-year-old male trotters entered there were no elims. The draw wasn't kind to the 2014 NYSS champion Crazy Wow, who will start from the trailing 11 post with Yannick Gingras driving for trainer Ron Burke. The Burke Stable sends out a second strong contender in Habitat, who will be driven by Jim Morrill Jr. from post 6.

Crazy Wow has won two of three starts this year, including an adventurous journey last time out in a NYSS division June 6 at Vernon Downs, when he recovered from early interference—falling more than 20 lengths behind the leader—to win in 1:55.2. Habitat, who broke his first two freshman starts in NYSS before turning it on in open competition to post wins in the William Wellwood Memorial and Matron, also captured his NYSS split on June 6, scoring in 1:53.4.

The EBC final for male trotters is scheduled as race 6 (approximate post 3:55 p.m.)

Barn Doll will start from post 4 on Sunday....2014 NYSS champion Crazy Wow...will start from the trailing 11 post.

I will take a stand here that SASSA HANOVER comes right back and gets the job done again. Gingras will give his filly the right trip, and he told me she can be in front of JK SHE'SALADY or behind her. The 2014 Horse of the Year came up a bit sick after her first-ever loss in the elim and then shipped back to New Jersey before returning to Canada, and if she's still not 100 percent, that certainly has an impact.

RACE 12

I talked to owner George Teague Jr. in 2003 with Rainbow Blue and through the years with his other star horses such as Total Truth and Mr. Wiggles, the sire of WIGGLE IT JIGGLEIT, and I've never heard him use the superlatives he's said about this gelding. I'm all in here and have both feet fully planted on the bandwagon.

Elliott Packs 1-2 Punch In Graduate Leg

Through the first two legs of the Graduate Series for 4-year-old pacers, it would be hard to find a trainer holding a stronger hand than Steve Elliott. Elliott has swept the series so far with his devastating duo of Doo Wop Hanover and Rockeyed Optimist. The pair will finally face each other as part of an overflow field of 12 going the extended 1 1/8-mile distance in the third leg of the Graduate Series on Friday at the Meadowlands.

"You never know what will happen in a 12-horse field going that distance," said Elliott. "We'll let the drivers decide what to do when the race starts."

In the opening leg of the series on May 25 at Tioga Downs, Rockeyed Optimist won his division in 1:48.1 while Doo Wop Hanover won his division in 1:47.4, the fastest mile ever at the Upstate New York track. The sons of Rocknroll Hanover came back to each win their respective divisions in leg two of the series at the Meadowlands on June 6 in 1:48.

"Tioga was pretty impressive. The Meadowlands is just a fast track, but I really think they both have 1:47 miles in them," said Elliott without hesitation.

Both horses are prime examples of why Meadowlands chairman Jeff Gural has advocated for more racing opportunities for 4 year olds. "Doo Wop" and "Rockeyed" were talented horses last year, but have blossomed into top-class racehorses after an extra year to develop.

"The older horses all have four 26-second quarters in them which makes them so tough," said Elliott in explaining 4 year olds versus older horses. "The 3 and 4 year olds can give you three 26-second quarters with a 27-second quarter. It's a big change from three to four and racing against just 4 year olds puts them on a more even keel."

Doo Wop Hanover will be reunited with his regular driver John Campbell, who missed driving him in his previous start while racing out of town. Tim Tetrick will once again get the drive on Rockeyed Optimist. (*Meadowlands*)

Nova Scotia Group On Cloud Nine With Wakizashi

For Tri County Stable of Truro, Nova Scotia, their direct flight to cloud nine was a \$23,000 ticket purchased at the Standardbred Horse Sale in Harrisburg in 2013. The six-partner syndicate will touch down at Mohawk Racetrack on Saturday night, in the hopes of watching Wakizashi Hanover trip the timer first in the Pepsi North America Cup final.

Comprised of Percy Bonnell, Scott Bowen, David Bugden, Wayne Burley, David Chabassol, and Bruce Kennedy, the group pooled \$20,000 in the hopes of jumping back into the racing game.

"Three of us have 50 years in the business," said partner Bruce Kennedy. "We had the yearning to get back into racing after some time away so we pulled a group together and hurried down to Harrisburg with the little Black Book in our hands."

The story of the Dragon Again gelding snowballs from there. Close friend and neighbor Brent MacGrath of Somebeachsomewhere fame spoke with his contacts at Hanover Shoe Farms, who compiled a list of their yearlings that were likely to fit the requirements of the group. Among the group was Wakizashi Hanover.

"We weren't looking for \$100,000 yearlings; we were looking for something more reasonable. Everyone judges and grades yearlings differently and with the help of that list, we narrowed it down to 50 or 60 horses," continued Kennedy.

As the sale progressed, the group put in bids on nine yearlings but failed to emerge the winning buyer. This caused them some concern, having purchased a new harness and all the necessary gear for their new horse earlier in the week.

"There were around 1,118 yearlings or so in the sale and he was 1,104. We really started looking at the last 15 horses; we paid a little bit over our budget for him but we were prepared to pay a bit extra over leaving without a horse at all," said Kennedy.

The group had connected with Maine-based trainer Gordon Corey prior to the sale, having worked with him in the past. The gelding shipped directly to Pinehurst, N.C., to learn the ropes under Corey's watchful eye.

As February arrived, so did stakes payment season. Unsure of what to pay him into, they chose to focus on the Pennsylvania Sires Stakes program. The 2 year old was showing his potential and didn't fail to catch the eye of others.

Involved with a horse racing in Harrington, Del., with Jim King Jr., Corey introduced King to the young hopeful.

"Jim was at the Fun Day at Pinehurst to wrap up the winter program," Kennedy recalled. "He came over and trained the horse a few trips and really liked him. He trained the horse in 2:19 and Gordon relayed to us how pleased Jim was with the horse."

"We made contact with Jim and said 'if you've got space for him, you've got him'. The plan was for Jim to keep him until July to see if he was good enough to bring home to race in our country. Long story short, he hasn't made it to Nova Scotia yet."

During his freshman campaign, Wakizashi Hanover posted a record of 2-3-0 in six starts and bankrolled over \$100,000 for his connections. Taking a mark of 1:51 over Pocono Downs in a Sires Stakes event, he always seemed to indicate that there was more left in the tank.

Wakizashi Hanover stormed home in his North America Cup elimination from sixth-place to claim victory in a career best of 1:49.2, holding off 1-5 favorite Artspeak in an impressive finish. Emerging from last Saturday fresh and in good spirits, Kennedy is confident in the horse's performance in the final.

"He gave us something he was hiding all along, after the race Tim (Tetrick) said to me, 'He was explosive today, he gave me more than anything I expected to get.' Tim has had

a few drives on him and it couldn't have been any better for us, the strategy panned out perfectly.

"This morning (June 17) we were at the training center and he trained awesome, he looks as ready as can be," Kennedy revealed. "The way he was this morning proved that. He has never missed a meal, rests himself well every day and he's just a happy and healthy horse."

Staked lightly last year due to financial constraints and uncertainty, Tri County have an impressive dance card slated for their horse in the upcoming season.

"We took all his earnings from last year in Pennsylvania and we reinvested it all in the 3-year-old stake program for him," shared Kennedy.

Wakizashi Hanover has many major events on his radar, with the Hempt, the Meadowlands Pace and the Milstein in the near future. The syndicate is also looking farther down the road with the Breeders Crown the goal at the end of the season, back on Canadian soil.

"I don't know if the horse gets as tired listening to all of these things as I do listing them, but he's got a full plate if he can handle it," said Kennedy. "It's a wicked schedule of fierce competitors.

"We're not the richest people in racing but we're the luckiest right now. This kind of a trip, I wish everyone could have this one day in harness racing, just once." (WEG)

Takter Compares "Canepa" To Trixton

During the winter, trainer Jimmy Takter said 3-year-old trotter Canepa Hanover could be "a Trixton kind of horse." As summer approaches, Canepa Hanover is doing his best to prove Takter correct.

Canepa Hanover is the 2-5 morning line favorite in Saturday's \$233,000 Goodtimes Stakes for 3-year-old trotters at Mohawk Racetrack. Last week, the colt won his Goodtimes elimination by 11 1/2 lengths over Iron in 1:51.3. The time equaled Trixton's track record set in last year's Goodtimes final.

But the similarities don't end there.

Both Trixton and Canepa Hanover are sons of Muscle Hill, the 2009 Horse of the Year, and hail from highly regarded families. Trixton is out of the mare Emilie Cas El, who was Canada's Horse of the Year in 1994 and sister to stars Conway Hall, Angus Hall and Andover Hall. Canepa Hanover is out of the mare Cressida Hanover, who also produced 2006 Horse of the Year Glidemaster. Trixton sold as a yearling for \$360,000; Canepa Hanover for \$300,000.

Both trotters were limited by growing pains at two and were overshadowed by some of their stablemates heading into their 3-year-old seasons. Trixton emerged early in his 3-year-old campaign and went on to capture the Hambletonian; now it is up to Canepa Hanover to write the rest of his story.

"He's going the same path," Takter said about Canepa Hanover, who has won two of five races this year and hit the board in every start. "A lot of these Muscle Hills, they have tons of ability, but it just takes time sometimes.

"Both Trixton and Canepa were among the better horses early (at age 2) but both are very big horses and they couldn't hold the speed together. They just weren't ready for it. You have to have a little patience with them."

This year Canepa Hanover posted two second-place finishes and a third in his first three starts, then captured the New Jersey Sires Stakes championship in 1:51.1 at the Meadowlands and his Goodtimes elim in 1:51.3. Those are the two fastest win times of any 3-year-old trotter this season.

"He's definitely a fantastic horse," said Takter, who trains Canepa Hanover for owners Brittany Farms, Brixton Medical Inc., Christina Takter, and the partnership of Sam Goldband, Marvin Katz and Al Libfeld. "His ability is unbelievable, as good as I ever saw.

"You always worry when you have horses climbing this kind of speed staying sound. He already has two (1):51 miles and a couple (1):52 miles. It's tough racing. But he's a beautiful horse."

Canepa Hanover and driver Yannick Gingras will start the Goodtimes final from post four. (HRC)

Coleman Updates About McWicked, Reverend Hanover

Although Casie Coleman has a strong Pepsi North America Cup contender in Arque Hanover, the trainer had thought Reverend Hanover might be in the race.

Reverend Hanover, who was four-for-four in Ontario Sires Stakes competition as a 2 year old, has suffered a setback. "He has a bone bruise on his right hind canon bone," Coleman revealed. "We're hoping he'll be back for the last half of the season. He's still jogging, but we can't train yet and we'll x-ray him again before determining if we can go forward this season."

When The Horseman's Gordon Waterstone polled trainers about their "top picks" for the 3-year-old trotting and pacing divisions this season, Coleman put Reverend Hanover on the top of her list. The Ontario Super Final champion had his freshman season delayed because he injured a front right shin and thus was not staked outside of the Sires Stakes.

Coleman also reported to harnessracing.com that McWicked, her 2014 Dan Patch 3-Year-Old Pacing Male of the Year, is nearing his 2015 debut.

"His first qualifier this year I was thrilled with, but his second qualifier he was awful, and we found he had an ulcer on his palette," said Coleman. "The ulcer was lasered and then trimmed by Dr. Ducharme."

International Trot Set For Oct. 10

It's taken two decades, but the International Trot, one of harness racing's elite events, is returning.

Yonkers Raceway, which last hosted the spectacle in 1995 (won by Sweden's His Majesty), is bringing it back, complete with a million-dollar purse. It's scheduled for Saturday afternoon, Oct. 10, and the seven-figure purse would be Yonkers' second-ever million-dollar race (2007 Art Rooney Pace, won by Southwind Lynx).

Here's what has been finalized so far: purse (\$1 million); distance (1¼ miles); horses invited (10); purse distribution (same as all events), winner—50 percent, 2nd—25 percent, 3rd—12 percent, 4th—8 percent, 5th—5 percent (non-cashing overseas entrants receive \$37,500 via a purse supplement, while non-cashing North American entrants receive \$10,000). (Yonkers)

Court Rules Michigan Board Violated Drivers' Rights

Mlive.com reported Tuesday (June 16) that a federal appeals court has ruled that the Michigan Gaming Control Board (MGCB) violated the constitutional rights of four harness drivers—John Moody, Don Harmon, Rick Ray and Wally McIlmurray Jr.—when it suspended their licenses for refusing to answer questions about fixing races.

The four horsemen claimed the MGCB violated their Fifth Amendment rights when they refused to answer questions al-

leging race fixing in May 2010. The four were accused of conspiring to fix the outcome of races at Hazel Park, Northville Downs and Sports Creek. No charges were ever filed nor were any of the four men convicted as a result of the allegations.

When attorneys for the drivers were told by a Michigan State Police detective that they would be arrested and charged with race fixing, they declined to answer the MGCB's questions. The MGCB then revoked the horsemen's licenses, and they were denied licenses the following three years, which precluded them from racing anywhere else due to reciprocity.

The drivers filed a federal lawsuit in 2012 seeking the return of their licenses and damages. A U.S. District Judge ruled against the drivers, citing they failed to show their constitutional rights were violated. The Court of Appeals on Tuesday ruled otherwise, stating they had the right to refuse to answer on the grounds they could be self-incriminating and they should be allowed to assert that right.

According to the MLive.com story, the case will now be returned to the U.S. District Court in Flint for further proceedings.

Hall Of Fame Communicator Alan Prince Dies

Alan Prince, a longtime journalist for the Miami Herald, a journalism professor at the University of Miami and 48-year national officer for the U. S. Harness Writers Association (USHWA) and a harness racing Hall of Fame Communicator inductee, died early Wednesday morning, June 17. He was 85.

Mr. Prince saw his first Standardbred race at Monticello Raceway in 1959 and from that point on he was bitten by the harness racing and journalism bug.

Mr. Prince was inducted into the Harness Racing Museum & Hall of Fame as a Communicator in 2007. He was inducted into the Florida Harness Racing Hall of Fame in 2008. Mr. Prince also received USHWA's Member of the Year Award in 1986 and later the national group named the award in his honor.

Among his many talents, Mr. Prince had also mastered the art of magic and sleight of hand card tricks that brought many a smile to those fortunate to catch his impromptu performances every year at the USHWA gatherings.

He is predeceased by his father, Irving Prince; mother, Rose (Shore) Prince, Plavin; brother, Joseph Prince; sister-in-law, Robin (Samson) Prince; and brother-in-law, Gordon Feltman. He is survived by his sister Carol (Prince) Feltman; brother, Martin Prince; sister-in-law, Andrea (Eisenberg) Prince; and six nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. on Friday, June 19, at Riverside-Gordon Memorial Chapels at Mt. Nebo Kendall Memorial Gardens, 5900 SW 77 Avenue, Miami, Fla. 33143.
