

Heston Blue Chip Chasing Honors; Pet Rock In From Windy City

Heston Blue Chip, fresh off an easy triumph in the Progress Pace at Dover Downs last Sunday, will be back in action at Dover this coming Sunday (Nov. 25) to compete in an elimination for the Matron 3-Year-Old Colt Pace. If Heston Blue Chip would win the Matron, the American Ideal colt would top off his late-season surge that began with a triumph in the Breeders Crown.

If he would win the vote, he would become the first horse to earn divisional honors without winning the North America Cup, Meadowlands Pace or Little Brown Jug since Art Major in 2002.

But first Heston Blue Chip has a big assignment in the Matron elim, one of two for the race. His split also includes BoltThe Duer and Pet Rock, who are coming into the race off of easy victories in the Messenger and Windy City Pace, respectively.

BoltThe Duer showed in the Messenger that he has rebounded from a respiratory ailment where treatment included racing him with Lasix. He won the Messenger by one-half length in 1:51.2 after sitting on the back of Pet Rock through a little more than half of the race.

BoltThe Duer appears to have a bit of an advantage in the Matron elim because he has drawn post position two, with the fast Mel Mara in post three, Pet Rock starting from post five, and Heston Blue Chip lining up in the sixth slot.

Virgil Morgan Jr., who trains Pet Rock, has confidence in his colt, but he felt like the draw was yet another bit of bad luck for Pet Rock this year. "This doesn't surprise me," he quipped.

Pet Rock has finished on the board in 16 of his 19 starts this season, with seven wins and five second-place finishes. Morgan said the colt has been the victim of bad racing luck in several instances.

"In the Breeders Crown he had too far to come from," he noted.

The chart of a Breeders Crown elimination confirms Morgan's point. With Brian Sears driving, Pet Rock got away seventh, was 10 lengths back and in the outer tier at the half, and

was still 6 1/4 lengths back at the top of the homestretch. He finished seventh but was only beaten 2 1/4 lengths thanks to his :26.3 final quarter, but did not advance to the Crown final.

Pet Rock's 1:51.4 victory in the Windy City Pace was pretty much a stroll in the park, and Morgan said his colt is on top of his game.

"He's been so sharp," said Morgan of the colt by Rocknroll Hanover out of the Artsplace mare Casual Beauty. "I think he can race with anybody, as long as he's put into play. He can be raced on the front end or off the pace. He's plenty versatile."

Doug McNair will be driving Pet Rock in the Matron elim. The duo is thus far undefeated in three starts together. McNair drove Pet Rock to a 1:50 score at Woodbine in a Preferred Pace the week before the Breeders Crown elimination, then teamed up again with the colt the night following the Crown extravaganza and won a Preferred again. George Brennan got the call to drive Pet Rock in the Messenger, but McNair was tapped to make the trip to Chicago for the Windy City.

Mel Mara drew post three in this Matron elim and can't be overlooked. He had his share of bad luck in the Breeders Crown final as he drew post position 10 and was stuck racing on the outside the entire mile, eventually finishing sixth, beaten just 3 3/4 lengths. A couple of weeks later he competed in the \$300,000 Ontario Sires Stakes Super Final and left hard but was stung to the opening quarter in :26.

Jacobs Talks About Heston's Year

Owner Ken Jacobs has long believed Heston Blue Chip is the best 3-year-old male pacer in the nation. He hopes that by winning the upcoming Matron Stakes at Dover Downs, Heston Blue Chip will convince a lot of other people as well.

Heston Blue Chip, trained by Linda Toscano and driven by Tim Tetrick, is coming off a win in Sunday's \$270,000 Progress Pace at Dover Downs in a stakes-record 1:49. This weekend, he faces six foes in one of two Matron Stakes eliminations,

from which the top four finishers advance to the Dec. 2 final.

Prior to winning the Progress Pace, Heston Blue Chip won the Progress Pace preview, the \$555,000 Breeders Crown, and his Breeders Crown elimination. For the year, the colt has won 13 of 16 races and earned \$934,316.

"We're trying to give him a chance to be the 3-year-old of the year," Jacobs said.

"He's the best 3-year-old in the country. I told everybody that and they didn't believe me. I think he's proven himself and he deserves a shot at that title. I don't know that we'll get it, but that's beside the point."

Heston Blue Chip ranks fifth in earnings for all 3-year-old male pacers in North America. He finished fifth in the Cane Pace and third in the New York Sire Stakes championship in his two starts prior to adding Lasix and beginning his current four-race win streak.

In addition to winning the Progress Pace and Breeders Crown, Heston Blue Chip (American Ideal-Shot Togo Bluechip) won the \$270,400 Empire Breeders Classic for New York-sired horses.

The Breeders Crown triumph was Jacobs' first in the championship series. He was second with 3-year-old filly pacer Lizbet Kash in 1996, second with 2-year-old colt pacer Kenneth J in 2006 and third with Kenneth J in 2008.

"You can't measure that thrill; that was just gigantic," Jacobs said. "I've been second, I've been third, but I'd never had a win, so it was something very special. It validated that he's a real good horse. I was happy for the horse to know he validated himself in that race. It's nice to have one that good."

Jacobs said Heston Blue Chip will return to the races next season as a 4-year-old. For now, though, he is focused on the Matron Stakes.

"If we win these next two (races), we'll establish ourselves as a contender for the top horse," Jacobs said. "Even if we don't win these next two, we've had a hell of a year." (*Harness Racing Communications*)

Perretti To Open PA Annex

Perretti Farms is opening a new stallion station in Newtown, Pa., just over the border from New Jersey, so its stallions can have the benefits of a solid sires stakes program in 2013.

Rocknroll Hanover, the leading money-winning sire of 3 year olds and all-age pacers this year, along with perennial trotting kingpin Muscles Yankee, and the young Lucky Chucky, will all stand at stud at the new Perretti in Pennsylvania location.

As New Jersey's sires stakes program has declined in value, at yearling sale time there has been a significant decline in popularity of offspring by sires standing at stud in the state.

Campbell Fined \$150 In Odds On Equuleus DQ Case

Following a formal hearing with two of the three track stewards at The Red Mile, driver John Campbell has been fined \$150 as a result of the disqualification of Odds On Equuleus from first to last in a Bluegrass division on Sept. 29. Campbell met with all three of the track stewards two days after the incident and was told at the time that no further sanctions would be given; however, there was a different result after the hearing on Tuesday, Nov. 13, at the Kentucky Racing Commission office in Lexington.

Campbell and Odds On Equuleus won the \$85,800 Bluegrass division but the stewards—Rich Williams, Dan Ross and Anthony Clark—DQ'd Odds On Equuleus, with their reasoning that he took up abruptly in the final turn and caused interference to the trailing horses, including a pair who went offstride. Trainer Robin Schadt went to the commission offices two days later to file an appeal, but later learned that until a ruling was given in writing to Campbell, an appeal could not be placed. As a result, Schadt and Campbell requested the hearing, and the two were joined by Lexington-based attorney William C. Hurt. Williams and Ross were the only two track judges at the hearing.

In issuing the ruling, the stewards wrote: "After weighing the evidence presented at a hearing requested by Mr. Campbell on 11/13/12 and the information immediately after the race, from the video replay and reports from drivers, it is the decision of the judges that Mr. Campbell and the horse Odds On Equuleus did slow the pace of the race sufficiently to cause confusion among the trailing horses. It is the judge's opinion that from talking to Mr. Campbell after the race, that the horse and the driver are both at some fault for the interference. The normal penalty for a driver in this type of infraction would be a 5 day driving suspension or a \$300.00 fine. In finding the horse and driver both at fault Mr. Campbell is fined \$150.00."

Trainer Schadt earlier told harnessracing.com that she and co-owner Dana Parham of Odds On Racing and Campbell filed an objection and motion to strike an affidavit given after the race by driver Yannick Gingras, who was in the sulky behind the second-placed-first winner Rockin Amadeus and was sitting in the two hole behind Odds On Equuleus when the alleged infraction occurred. Schadt and Parham believe Gingras's affidavit was "materially misleading." The affidavit objected to Gingras's testimony that: "Within 2-3 strides after taking the lead position, John Campbell 'slammed on his brakes' and Odds On Equuleus dramatically slowed down. As a result of this sudden change of pace, I was struck in the back and head by the horse Real Rocker, driven by Brian Sears in the third position at the time."

In asking that Gingras's affidavit be stricken, Odds On and Campbell claimed that "from the time Campbell took the lead until Real Rocker collided into Gingras, fourteen seconds elapsed. From the spot where Campbell took the lead to where Real Rocker collided with Gingras, the horses traveled seven hundred feet—more than 1/8 of a mile. The race video is undisputable and demonstrates that Gingras' statement to Mr. Williams was false, or, at best, materially misleading."

Following Tuesday's announcement of Campbell's fine, Schadt told harnessracing.com that the appeal process will continue. She also said that Campbell will appeal his fine.

Rich N Elegant Dies At 22

Rich N Elegant, the mare which many consider to be the greatest Standardbred broodmare ever, was humanely euthanized Friday, Nov. 16, at Hanover Shoe Farms in Pennsylvania due to a severe bout with colic. Rich N Elegant, who was a Harness Racing Hall of Fame broodmare, was 22 years old.

Rich N Elegant, originally named Armbro Literal, born on St. Patrick's day March 17, 1990, was bred and raised by the iconic Armstrong Bros. organization in Canada. There was very little in her formative years which would lead one to believe that she would achieve the greatness that ultimately came to her. Although she was sired by the successful Direct Scooter and came from a noted family brought to prominence by the late Bill Shehan and subsequently carried on mostly by both Kentuckiana and Brittany Farms, she was a relatively bargain priced yearling, selling for \$22,000 to trainer John Kopas, acting as agent for Vincent Li.

She enjoyed moderate success on the racetrack, taking records of 1:57.2f and 1:56.4f at 2 and 3. She ended her racing career with earnings just short of \$100,000 (\$96,244) and actually ended up racing for a claiming tag of \$15,000.

There were no takers at that price. She ultimately came to the attention of bloodstock agent Bob Boni, who offered her to Hanover Shoe Farms for the bargain basement price of \$12,000. That's when the fireworks began.

Her first mating was with the then unproven Western Hanover. Interestingly, she was the only maiden represented in that stallion's first book of mares. Little did one know at the time that both sire and dam were destined to make harness racing history. From that first booking came the Metro winner Rustler Hanover p,2,1:52.3, 3,1:51 (\$971,638). Her next foal was the multiple stakes and FFA winner Royalflush Hanover p,2,1:52.2h, 3,1:51.3, 1:49.3 (\$2,153,813). Subsequently she produced her greatest foal the world champion Rocknroll Hanover p,2,1:49.4; 3,1:48.3 (\$2,754,038); the North America Cup winner Red River Hanover p,2,1.52.2, 3,1:48.4 (\$965,426), and the Woodrow Wilson winner Richess Hanover p,2, 1:53 (\$557,537).

It could be argued that she played a big part in the success enjoyed by the stallions Western Hanover, Cam's Card Shark and Western Ideal, since Rustler Hanover, Royalflush Hanover and Rocknroll Hanover came from the first crop by each of those sires.

In 2009 Rich N Elegant received the honor of being inducted into the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame. In recent years she has not conceived. However, she has an untrained 2 year old named Russell Hanover (by Somebeachsomewhere) that was injured as a baby and was unable to be sold as a yearling or trained.

Hanover's Farm Manager, Dr. Bridgette Jablonsky, described Rich N Elegant as "a perfect mother. She was very smart. When it was time for the mares and foals to come in, all the other mares would be trying to push their way to the front, putting their foals in precarious positions with hooves flying all around them. She would wait calmly at the very back with her foal, being usually the last to come in. In fact, I can't remember ever treating a foal by her side for a wound of any kind. She wasn't a people-friendly horse like Cathedra. I would always describe her as being somewhat aloof, but without a mean bone in her body.

"She developed hydrops during her pregnancy in 2008 and subsequently lost the foal she was carrying and almost her life. Her last foal was born in 2010 via embryo transfer. That colt, by Somebeachsomewhere, was kicked in the hock as a baby and was unable to be trained. I always said that if Richie had raised him, he never would have been hurt.

"She battled health problems for the last few years of her life. She lived in a large paddock with a blind mare as her buddy. When she colicked on Friday morning, we tried every medical treatment available to get her comfortable, but it became apparent that it was a surgical colic. Because of her health problems and age, it was decided that abdominal surgery held little promise of success. We decided it

would be unfair to her. She was put to sleep with much sadness at 11:04 a.m."

Rich N Elegant was buried at the Hanover Shoe Farms equine cemetery, which is the final resting place for the many great stallions and mares that have called Hanover Shoe Farms their home. (*Hanover Shoe Farms*)

He also at one time operated and owned Fil-A Sak Grocery in Lexington, Ky., and his hobbies included travel, flying planes, and coaching baseball and basketball.

He is survived by his wife, Billie Hill Kelly; two daughters, Jan (Jeff) Calvert and Anne (Andy) Gross, for whom he named his farm; and three grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in Lexington.

David Miller Tops \$10 Million Again

In August, driver David Miller won his first Hambletonian Oaks with Personal Style. On Sunday, she helped Miller to another memorable moment by winning the \$149,400 Matron Stakes for 3-year-old filly trotters at Dover Downs, pushing Miller's seasonal earnings beyond \$10 million.

The purse earnings from the Matron victory extended Miller's own record for most \$10-million seasons in harness racing history to 11. He also joined Ron Pierce and Brian Sears as the only drivers to post \$10-million campaigns over eight consecutive years.

"I was hoping I wasn't done," the 47-year-old Miller said, laughing. "I'm very happy it turned out that way again. I think it's great."

With \$10.18 million in earnings this year, Miller ranks No. 3 among all drivers in North America. Tim Tetrick, with \$17.79 million, leads the way, followed by Yannick Gingras, at \$12.78 million.

Miller ranks fourth in history, with \$164 million, trailing only John Campbell, Pierce and Mike Lachance. Campbell is No. 2 on the list for most \$10-million seasons, with nine.

Personal Style got her first win since capturing the Hambletonian Oaks on Aug. 4 at the Meadowlands. She won the Matron by 2-1/4 lengths over favorite Win Missy B in a stakes-record 1:53.2.

Win Missy B, starting from post six in the eight-horse field, went to the lead in a :55.4 opening half-mile. Miller and Personal Style, who started from post one, raced second over around the second turn before moving alongside Win Missy B with a three-wide move on the backstretch. Personal Style grabbed the lead at the top of the stretch on her way to her fourth win in 19 starts this year for trainer Nifty Norman and owners Mel Hartman and Brittany Farms.

"I was real happy with her," Miller said. "She hasn't won that many this year, but she was very good (finishing second) in the Matron elimination and I told Nifty if we could just draw inside (Win Missy B) it would be good. All I needed was for that mare to get pushed a little to the half and I thought I could beat them.

"It worked out real good. She was very sharp. I thought she was my best shot to win."

In addition to winning with Personal Style, Miller won the \$165,975 Matron Stakes for 2-year-old male pacers with Twilight Bonfire, finished second in the Matron for 2-year-old

male trotters with Sand Royal Blu, third in the Matron for 2-year-old filly pacers with UF Dragon's Queen, and finished third in the Progress Pace with Bettor's Edge.

"Going into the night, I thought I would have a good night," Miller said. "I didn't know if I was going to win any, but I thought I had some pretty good horses to drive. I thought things could go real well. I got lucky with the draws and a lot of them raced good." (*Harness Racing Communications*)

Caraluzzi Raises \$2,080 For SRF

Jimmy Caraluzzi, 22, a recent Rutgers University graduate working as a groom for his father, Joe, while looking for professional employment, turned in a time of 3:37.57 for the 26.2 miles of the Philadelphia Marathon on November 18, and raised \$2,080 for the Standardbred Retirement Foundation in the process.

Caraluzzi was running his very first marathon and asked for pledges to benefit the SRF, exceeding his \$2,000 goal, about \$80 a mile. Caraluzzi's run comes at a time when the SRF has an anonymous donor matching all donations dollar for dollar until the end of the year, so Caraluzzi's run is actually worth \$4,160 to the SRF, which is caring for over 100 horses.

"We are very grateful to Jimmy," said SRF Treasurer Judith Bokman. "Fundraisers like this are so very helpful in allowing us to use our time to get these horses adopted and follow up on them for life. It is nice to see young blood in racing with a passion for the horses' welfare." (*Harness Racing Communications*)

USTA District 7 Meets

The United States Trotting Association District 7 annual meeting and banquet took place on Saturday, Nov. 17 at the Holiday Inn in Clarion, PA. At the meeting, Chairman Walter "Boots" Dunn stepped down from that position and passed the reins to Sam Beegle.

"I'm going to continue on as a USTA director, but Sam (Beegle) is going to take over as chairman," said Dunn in making the announcement.

Joining Dunn and Beegle in conducting the meeting was Russell Williams. After discussion, four of 11 proposed USTA rule and bylaw changes were approved, two with suggested amendments. Six others were rejected and one had no action taken on it.

Other topics discussed at the meeting were the importance of developing PAC funding, a three-year plan by the PHHA to donate \$200,000 annually to Soma/Maylin Initiative, including a \$470,000 equipment donation, the marketing efforts of the MSOA, including a re-doubling

of the budget for next year, and the 50th anniversary of the Meadows in 2013.

Passed without amendment were rule proposals 7 and 9. The first (7) states, "A proposal to amend Rule 26, section 2(h) by changing the first sentence to read as follows: "the status of a previously registered Standardbred may be changed to Pleasure Horse upon application by the owner and surrender of the Registration Certificate to the USTA."

The second (9) is "A proposal to amend the Bylaws to provide that any appeal from the denial, revocation or suspension of membership under the provisions of Article 3, Section 4 must be heard by the Full Board of Directors."

The first suggested amendment was to rule proposal 8, which is for the addition of a new section to Rule 20 – STANDARD OF CONDUCT. The proposal calls for a minimum one-year suspension for "any person who shall represent themselves to be the registered owner of a horse knowing said horse to be owned wholly or in part by a person or persons barred or otherwise disqualified from participating in racing." The amendment added a recommendation to increase the penalty for violations.

The other amendment was to add "as determined by the USTA Executive Vice President" to the end of rule proposal

10 to amend Article 1, section 3(m), which replaces the word "horse" with "animal." The proposal states, "Forthwith, any person who has been the subject of a final order in a prosecution under any state animal welfare statute shall be disqualified from membership in this Association for a minimum period of one year with the length of the disqualification beyond one year to be determined by the gravity of the offense."

Those rejected were proposals on clarification of "Bonus Earnings" relative to conditioned races; a new subsection to Rule 9 involving race numbering; an amendment to Rule 14 to prohibit a horse from multiple, same day entries in county fairs; amending Rule 17 to require applicants for an (M) license to be at least 16 years of age; and amending Rule 24 to change the timing of races from fifths of a second to one hundredths of a second.


No action was taken on a proposal to amend Rule 17 to change name and requirements for provisional drivers.

On Saturday evening, just over 100 people were in attendance at the annual banquet honoring fair racing award winners at the same hotel. The formal portion of the banquet concluded with a salute and thank you to outgoing Chairman Dunn by PHHA Executive Director Ron Battoni, which drew a standing ovation. (USTA)
