Landy Has Three Fresh 3YOs In Friday At Meadowlands

The two new series at the Meadowlands for 3 year olds were a welcome addition to the racing calendar for New Jersey horseman Harry Landy. Landy has three starters in the events this Friday night, two in the Walner for trotters and one in the Wiggle It Jiggleit for pacers.

"I got them ready to race early because I wanted to get them some experience, and these races really help," said the 27-year-old horseman.

Landy's trotters, LA Dolfina (Race 2) and HL Revadon (Race 4), are going into the Walner off of strong starts last week.

LA Dolfina, a son of Credit Winner, was unraced at age two but has a win and a third in two starts this year, with his victory over the Meadowlands surface on March 22. He finished third in an overnight at Harrah's Philadelphia last week, gaining ground in the stretch and trotting his own mile in 1:56.2.

"He's a nice little horse," said Landy of LA Dolfina, who he bought as a yearling for \$42,000 for his father Sam's stable (Share A Horse Inc.) "He got pretty sick last year, just viral. I was stabled in Saratoga (N.Y.) and sometimes it seems like when the Thoroughbreds come to town, there are more viruses around. So once he got sick it just seemed like a good idea not to push him."

HL Revadon made one start as a 2 year old but after several qualifiers he flashed some speed last week in a non-

winner of two at the Meadowlands, trotting his own mile in 1:55 to finish second.

"He was just immature," said Landy of HL Revadon's lack of racing at age two. "I put him behind the gate a few times, but that was all."

HL Revadon is a son of Andover Hall out of D Liteful Hanover, a Revenue-sired half sister to Donato Hanover. He was a \$35,000 yearling purchase.

"He's a pretty good horse right now, but with the breeding, I think he'll be even better later," he added.

Both LA Dolfina and HL Revadon are staked to the Dexter Cup (elims April 27) at Freehold Raceway.

"I would love to win that race. That's where I started going to the track," he shared.

Landy's contender in the Wiggle It Jiggleit (Race 11) is OdeTo Gray, a gray colt by Roll With Joe owned by his grandfather, Gene Landy. He made seven starts at age two, but didn't make his first start until Aug. 2 at Vernon

Downs. In his seventh start he showed promise, finishing second, and pacing in 1:52.4, at the Meadowlands on Dec. 29.

This year OdeTo Gray has made two starts, both at the Meadowlands, with a second and a third.

"OdeTo Gray was a little sick last week and he drew post 8, but hopefully he'll be charging at the end," said Landy.—

Updates On Mark Witha K, Endeavor

The four-week Wiggle It Jiggleit and Walner series for 3 year olds of both gaits get underway Friday night at the Meadowlands. Three preliminary legs will be followed by a \$60,000 (est.) final on Saturday, April 27 for both events.

The primary condition for both series is non-winners of two pari-mutuel races or \$40,000 lifetime as of Feb. 15, 2019, and the recent Jeff Cullipher-trained acquisition Mark Witha K fits the Wiggle It Jiggleit criteria to a T. The son of American Ideal—named for breeder Fair Winds Farm owner Mark Mullen—brings a resume of one win and \$36,779 into Friday's first round, starting from post 6 with driver David Miller in the second \$15,000 division (Race 11).

The Wiggle It Jiggleit attracted a hodgepodge of pacers, with Mark Witha K's division including four Ron Burke trainees, including a pair that started in Grand Circuit events last fall at The Red Mile, a 2018 winner on the New York Sires Stakes Excelsior circuit, and a Kindergarten Series entrant.

A \$42,000 yearling purchase, Mark Witha K won one of nine starts last year for trainer Linda Toscano—a 1:59 effort in an Excelsior division in his career debut last July at Buffalo Raceway—and had three seconds in four starts this year before being purchased by Cullipher and Pollack Racing on March 15. In two starts for his new connections—at the Meadowlands in his first starts on a one-mile oval—Mark Witha K finished second and fourth.

"Tom Pollack found him and we watched him race at Yonkers," explained Cullipher. "He was a fair price and it made sense to take a chance on a change of scenery. He's a big, good-looking horse and he fits well in the series." On Saturday night Cullipher will send out Endeavor in a \$50,000 division of the George Morton Levy Memorial Series at Yonkers Raceway.

Endeavor has a win sandwiched by fourths in his three Levy preliminaries, and heading into Saturday's race the 6-year-old son of American Ideal is 10th in the standings. With a good effort on Saturday, Endeavor should propel himself into the top eight with one last leg next Saturday before the rich final on April 20.

"I have no real excuse for last week and was let down by him a little bit off the performance the week before," said Cullipher, noting Endeavor leading through three-quarters before tiring to fourth a week after a 2 1/4-length 1:52.2 win in the second round. "I think he fits well in there but it's a tough series."

Cullipher said he plans on racing Endeavor in next week-end's penultimate leg before hopefully the final.

"We went into the series with his first start (of the year) but I didn't want to go in with too many starts because you

While the fourth of the five preliminary rounds in the past has given trainers a chance to rest the leaders as they prepare for the lucrative finals on April 20, that's not the case this time around. While there are only three \$40,000 Matchmaker divisions on Friday night, only one of the top 15 and two of the top 20 are not lining up behind the gate. In Saturday's four Levy splits, only three of the top 20 will not be on the track.

A three-way tie at the top of the Matchmaker standings will be broken this week as the Dylan Davis-trained Apple Bottom Jeans will not be joining Feelin Red Hot and Bettor Joy N in competition. All three have two wins and a second in the three Matchmaker preliminaries, but after Apple Bottom Jeans finished second by a neck at odds of 1-5 to Feelin Red Hot, she'll sit this week out.

Feelin Red Hot, driven by George Brennan for trainer Ron Burke, will start from post 3 in the first Matchmaker division (Race 7). The 6-year-old daughter of Feelin Friskie upset reigning Older Pacing Mare of the Year Shartin N two starts back and then last week won the photo in a hard-fought contest against Apple Bottom Jeans. DontThinkTwice A is the only other Levy prelim winner in the field and he'll start from post 1 for driver Jason Bartlett and trainer Andrew Harris.

Bettor Joy N, who missed by a nose in the first round before notching two straight victories, starts from the outside post 7 in the second division (Race 8) for driver Tim Tetrick and trainer Jim King Jr. Ideal Lifestyle A, with a win and two seconds in the prelims, starts from post 1 for driver George Brennan and trainer Tahnee Camilleri, while Delightfulmemphisn, who has a win and a fifth in just two Matchmaker starts and currently sits 11th in the standings, starts from post 6 for driver Bartlett and trainer Nifty Norman.

Seaswift Joy N and Shartin N, respectively fourth and fifth in the standings, meet up in the third Matchmaker split (Race 9). Tetrick will leave from post 5 with the King-trained Shartin N, while Jim Marohn Jr. will have his work cut out for him starting from post 8 with the Tony Alagna-trained Seaswift Joy N.

In Saturday's Levy splits, both Western Fame and Ideal Jimmy, tied for the lead in the standings with each having a pair of wins and a second, will go behind the gate. Sitting

out among the leaders is third-place Rodeo Rock and seventh-place (in a tie) Mac's Jackpot. Duplicated N, who is 15th in the standings, also isn't starting but trainer King has instead entered him in the Open Pace April 4 at Dover Downs.

Western Fame starts from post 3 for driver Daniel Dube and trainer Rene Allard in the last of the four divisions (Race 10). The only other starter with a Levy win under his belt is Somewhere In LA, who starts from post 2 for driver Bartlett and trainer Richard Banca.

Ideal Jimmy, who won his first two prelims before coming up a neck short last time out, starts from post 8 in the third Levy division for driver Brent Holland and trainer Erv Miller. Prelim winners The Downtown Bus and Lyons Steel start from post 4 and 6, respectively. Also in the field is the Linda Toscano-trained Somebaddude (post 3), who took a week off from Levy competition last weekend after a second and seventh, but tuned up for round four with a 1:53.4 victory on Monday night (April 1) at Yonkers. — *By Gordon Waterstone*

Pinkman Ready For 2019 Debut For Engblom

Pinkman, who won the 2015 Hambletonian on his way to being named Trotter of the Year, is ready for a new season and trainer Per Engblom is cautiously optimistic that “the old man” is poised for a solid campaign. The 7-year-old gelding makes his seasonal debut Friday in the preferred handicap trot at The Meadowlands, which could be the first of two preps for Pinkman ahead of May’s Arthur J. Cutler Memorial at the Big M.

For the past several years, Pinkman has been troubled by chronic throat and breathing issues; he made a total of only 14 starts at ages 4 and 5. Last year, he enjoyed his healthi-

est campaign since age 3 and equaled his career high for starts with 17.

Pinkman heads to Friday’s race off a 1:54.2 win in a qualifier at the Meadowlands on March 30. He starts from post 6 in an eight-horse field and is 5-1

on the morning line with Yannick Gingras in the sulky.

“The old man is doing good,” Engblom said about Pinkman. “He had a good winter, actually a little bit better winter than he’s had the last couple years. We didn’t miss any training with him. He’s been staying healthy, he’s been breathing well, and he qualified great.

“You have to take him for what he is. He’s an older horse and you can’t really push him. But if he’s feeling well, he will give you what he’s got.”

Engblom is well acquainted with Pinkman. A native of Sweden, Engblom is in his first year running his own stable in the U.S. following six seasons as the top assistant in Jimmy Takter’s stable, where Pinkman has spent his career.

Pinkman, a son of Explosive Matter out of Margie Seelster, has won 19 of 56 career races and earned \$2.73 million for owners Christina Takter, brothers John and Jim Fielding, Joyce McClelland, and Herb Liverman. He was a Dan Patch

Grismore, Cummings Score First Wins

A pair of racing progeny have posted their first career driving wins over the past week. On Friday night, March 29, Curtis Grismore, the 24-year-old son of Ohio-based Greg Grismore, notched his maiden victory with Dreamsteeler (pictured), while on Wednesday, April 3, 18-year-old Kyle Cummings, the son of veteran horseman Todd Cummings, found the winner’s circle for the first time with Jude Hall.

Curtis Grismore’s first win came with the 8-year-old mare Dreamsteeler in 1:59.2 in the \$7,300 Open Trot. He wasted no time earning win two as he scored a 1:57.4 victory the following night with Liberal in a \$5,800 conditioned pace.

Kyle Cummings’ win came with the 9-year-old gelding Jude Hall, who is owned by his mother, Tammy. The 1:59.2 score in a Class D pacing event was the first of the year for Jude Hall.

Award winner at ages 2 and 3 and counts the Canadian Trotting Classic, Kentucky Futurity, and Beal and Zweig memorials among his victories in addition to the Hambletonian.

Despite his health woes in recent years, Pinkman has earned \$270,212 since turning 4. He won a Group 2 race in Sweden in 2016 and was stakes-placed last year. He trotted 1:49.2 in Homicide Hunter’s 1:48.4 world-record mile in the Allerage Open Trot at Lexington’s Red Mile, where he finished third.

“He had a little bad luck last year,” Engblom said, referring to eight starts from posts eight, nine, 10 or the second tier. “At the end of last year, he was doing pretty well. He trotted (1):49 and a piece in Lexington. He’s still got it, we just need to manage him. That’s the key.

“He’s been so solid (preparing for this season). I really think he’s going to do OK. I’m really confident he can have a pretty good year. He’s a sound horse. His legs are as tough as they come. It’s fun to work with classy old horses like him. It’s a thrill every time you train him.” (Ken Weingartner)

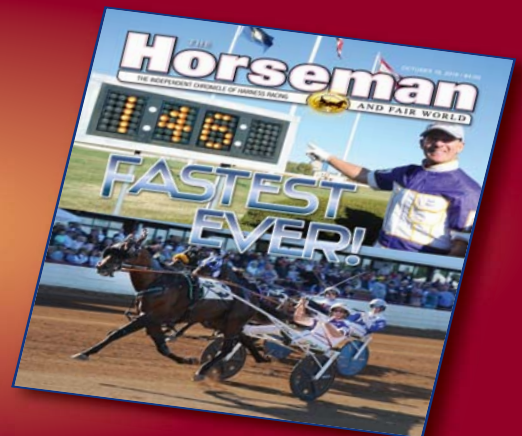

Significant Meadowlands Handle Increase

The Meadowlands has seen an increase of 28 percent in all-sources wagering on the live racing product over the first quarter of 2019 versus the 2018 figures.

Thus far in 2019 the amount wagered on Meadowlands races both live in the building and on the exported signal is \$73,429,590 against \$56,969,899 over the first quarter of 2018.

Further broken down, the handle increase in the live on track is at 15 percent while the exported signal is 30 percent higher than last year.

"We believe that the purse subsidy has had the positive effect on handle that we expected. Hopefully the positive momentum we have established will continue as we enter the next phase of the racing season with the younger horses coming back followed closely by the Grand Circuit stakes season," said Meadowlands chairman and CEO Jeff Gural. (*Meadowlands*)

Dorothy “Dottie” Haughton Dies

Dorothy “Dottie” Haughton, the widow of the late Hall of Famer Billy Haughton, died Monday, April 1, at age 87. She had been in failing health this winter.

Remick & Gendron Funeral Home, 811 Hampton Rd., Hampton, N.H. 03842, is handling arrangements. Visitation will be held Sunday, April 7, from 4-6 p.m. and again on Monday, April 8, from 3-5 p.m. A memorial service will be held at 5 p.m.

Mrs. Haughton was well known for her involvement with harness racing during her husband’s career, including breeding and co-owning his great mare trotting champion Keystone Pioneer. Mrs. Haughton and her husband drove a team of horses in the inaugural parade for President Ronald Reagan.

Dorothy Haughton was born in Chappaqua, N.Y., on Dec. 9, 1931, the daughter of the late Whitney H. and Esther L. (Linder) Bischoff. A graduate of Chappaqua High School, Dorothy went on to become a licensed X-ray technician and worked at Westchester Medical Center.

She grew up watching her father, Whitney Bischoff, race horses at the fairs around the Goshen, N.Y., area. She was with her father at Goshen’s GoodTime Park and saw the great trotter Greyhound win the Hambletonian. Her father was also a judge at Yonkers Raceway and one day he invited a talented 27-year-old horseman named Bill Haughton home for dinner. Bill asked 19-year-old Dottie to the track to jog a horse. About a month later, they were married.

The young couple settled in Oyster Bay, Long Island, N.Y., to raise their family, which grew to include five children, Bill Jr., Peter, Tom, Cammie and daughter Holley.

Mrs. Haughton showed an enormous capacity to handle life’s most difficult times. She most famously dealt with the death of her son Peter from injuries sustained in a car crash outside the Meadowlands in the winter of 1980, and again when her husband Bill died following injuries suffered in a racing accident at Yonkers Raceway in 1986.

Together, the Haughtons walked through their grief following the death of their son Peter, who had followed in his father’s footsteps and become an accomplished horseman and a key member of the W.R. Haughton Stable.

The Haughton family’s grieving became a matter of national news in September 1980 when Bill drove the colt Burgomeister, a colt Peter co-owned, to victory in the Hambletonian in Du Quoin, Ill. The couple embraced and cried together in Du Quoin’s famous Victory Lane.

In an interview in later years, Mrs. Haughton described how difficult it was for her husband to go on following the death of their son, especially to work with horses that had been specifically Peter’s, as was the case with Burgomeister.

“After Peter died, Bill really couldn’t go near the horse for a month or so,” she recalled.

She prodded him, calling his reluctance “crazy,” and said then her husband became “obsessed with trying to get this horse to the Hambletonian.”

When Burgomeister won the race, she acknowledged what everyone saw on national television: “lots of tears; happiness tears; sadness tears.”

Mrs. Haughton was personally involved with many of the horses in the W.R. Haughton Stable.

“A pacer named Titanic was the first horse I ever owned,” Mrs. Haughton said, “but I, or with Bill, have owned as many as 100 in a year and thousands over the years, including from 50 to 60 Thoroughbreds.”

She recalled Green Speed as a personal standout, as well as Meadow Elva, a champion filly pacer, whose success helped Dottie get over an illness. But her all-time favorite was Keystone Pioneer, one of the sport’s great trotting fillies. A trotter named Peter Campbell was a favorite — they named their first child after him. Peter’s middle name, Delvin, was in honor of good friend Delvin Miller.

Mrs. Haughton watched her son Tommy become the youngest driver ever to win the Hambletonian when he captured the 1982 edition of the race with Speed Bowl, chalking up another victory for the Haughton family in the historic race.

A self-described “homemaker, mother and grandmother,” Mrs. Haughton was a trustee of the Harness Racing Museum & Hall of Fame since 1982 and especially active for the past two decades, serving as both a trustee and secretary for over 26 years.

Mrs. Haughton received many awards over the years. Sports Illustrated magazine presented her with an Award of Merit and the United States Harness Writers Association presented her with its Good Guy Award. Her gardening talents saw her win the Sweepstakes Award Horticulture & Artistic Design five times and she maintained the beautiful gardens and grounds at her home until her passing. During her years living on Long Island she showed her cultivars all over Long Island

Mrs. Haughton is survived by three sons, all of whom have been involved with harness racing—Tommy; Cameron “Cammie,” a racing official and Bill Jr., who works in livestock insurance; her daughter, Holley Tufano (Gerard Porteus); grandchildren Tommy Haughton (Lauren), Billy Haughton, Jake Tufano, Peter (Elizabeth) Tufano, Katie Haughton, and Cameron Haughton; a great-granddaughter, Cora Tufano; lifetime family friend and caregiver Mary Tatum; and her Shih Tzu puppy, Timmy.

A Celebration of Life will be held in July at the Harness Racing Museum followed by burial in the Holy Rood Cemetery in Westbury, N.Y., where she can rest in peace with the loves of her life, her husband and son Peter. Museum president Larry DeVan agreed.

“We are thrilled to continue to support Harness Racing’s legacy in the Cradle of the Trotter, and strive to build upon its celebrated origins in Goshen that began in 1838.”

The idea of pooling resources was recognized as a solution to one of the Hall of Fame’s biggest challenges: Where to store the enormous quantity of items and artifacts that continues to be donated to the Museum. The intention is to utilize the soon-to-be-constructed historic replica “barn” that occupies land on the grounds of Goshen Historic Track.

Also on hand to speak to the importance of the project were Harry Porr, Deputy Orange County Executive; Doug Bloomfield, Town of Goshen Supervisor; Mike Nuzzolese and Kyle Roddy, current and former Mayors of the Village of Goshen; Ted Lewis, Goshen Building Inspector; and Barbara Martinez, Executive Director of the Goshen Chamber of Commerce.

Although each speaker brought their own unique perspective to the project, one consistent theme was prevalent: the significance of harness racing to Goshen and the assistance needed to realize this vital rebuilding endeavor.

Museum director Janet Terhune, who has helped spearhead the project noted, “The track is in the home stretch of its second century of operation. We owe it to the sport of harness racing to ensure that this grand history is promoted and preserved, and in this case, revitalized.”

FIRST Over

Yep, it's happened again. The recent nomination of Bill Robinson to the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame ballot has created a bit of outrage, but I'm disappointed there hasn't been more, especially since it is the second straight year Robinson has been nominated.

True, Robinson has won the races and been associated with horses that put horsemen in the Hall of Fame. Yes, he's a four-time Canadian Trainer of the Year and his stable included Mach Three, Precious Bunny, Riyadh, Presidential Ball, Art Major, Cam's Card Shark, Dragon Again and Western Dreamer.

But Robinson has major integrity violations that should disqualify a person for consideration in any horse racing hall of fame. On Dec. 20, 2003, the Ontario Racing Commission slapped Robinson with a five-year suspension and a \$100,000 penalty, which following appeals resulted in a suspension totaling 27 months and a fine of \$125,000. In addition, Robinson was banned by the Woodbine Entertainment Group (WEG) for having multiple violations.

So why nominate Robinson, and for that matter even Luc Ouellette? Last year Ouellette had a positive for a Class 2 drug. He served a 90-day suspension and is presently in the midst of a two-year probation.

These nominations are an affront to their efforts to improve racing.

So how did Robinson and Ouellette get put on the ballot this year? Darryl Kaplan, president of the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame and the editor of Standardbred Canada's Trot magazine, responded to a column by Andrew Cohen in last Friday's Harness Racing Update about the nominations. He included the Hall of Fame's policy, which reads, "At the discretion of the Nominating Committee and Election Committee of the relevant breed, entry to the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame as an honored member will

not be considered for anyone who has engaged in misconduct considered to be detrimental to the best interest of the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame, its members, and the racing community in general."

Kathy Wade Vlaar is the current chair of the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame's Standardbred Nominating Committee. The committee also includes Dave Briggs, Kent Oakes, Ted Smith, Dr. Maurice Stewart, Hec Clothier, Jamie Martin and Dow Clowater. Vlaar told me via email that Robinson's nomination "wasn't unanimous but there wasn't dissent."

Most of us would consider Robinson's violations and 11-year exclusion by WEG a clear case of someone whose "misconduct" would be "detrimental to the best interest of the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame, its members, and the racing community in general."

Election to the U.S. Hall of Fame takes place through a process handled by the U.S. Harness Writers' Association (USHWA). I'm a member of USHWA and served on its Hall of Fame Screening Committee for six years. It was serious work and we vetted candidates thoroughly. For me, if I had ever heard even a whisper of a possible integrity violation by a candidate, I thoroughly researched that person. The easy part was simply doing a search of rulings, but I also called folks who I respected who worked in the racing community with the candidate. And often, as I suspected, I learned of reasons to reject a few candidates.

Today USHWA also has an Integrity Committee which reviews a list of candidates submitted by various USHWA chapters BEFORE the names get to the Screening Committee. This allows the Screening Committee members to focus on achievements instead of integrity.

I wonder why the "horsemen" part of the recent ballot for the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame wasn't sufficient with the names of Canadians Larry Walker (winner of the Maple Leaf Trot and Canadian Pacing Derby), trotting Trevor Ritchie, and John Bax (Goodtimes, Duke Of York, Define The World), three horsemen who have plenty of accomplishments and nary a smudge on their career resumes.

Robinson chose to disregard rules. That was his decision. The Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame Standardbred Election Committee, comprised of 20 people—horsemen, breeders, media and racing executives—will now decide if a rule violator should be a Hall of Famer.
